


conversations you want to have.


Photoshop CC Tips

Add Brightness and Contrast using Hard Mix Brush:

- Depress the **Create new layer** icon at the bottom of the layers panel.
- Set the Layer Blend mode to Hard Mix and the Fill to 10–20%.
- Set the Foreground Color Swatch with a color from the photo. Click on the Eyedropper Tool or click on the Foreground Color Swatch to launch the Color Picker.
- Then click on the Brush Tool (B) and paint over areas that you selected the color.
- This technique works great on cityscape images. Click on an orange area as shown in figure to the right with the Eyedropper Tool to set the *Foreground Color Swatch* color. Then with your **Brush tool**, paint over the buildings to brighten and increase contrast.

Camera Raw Filter:

- This filter allows you to access many of the helpful correction tools that are available in Adobe Camera Raw (when you open a Raw image in Photoshop). The Camera Raw Filter will directly alter pixel values. Some features/adjustments are removed when using Camera Raw Filter such as Rotate, Crop, Save, camera specific Lens corrections, and Camera profiles.
- When using the Camera Raw Filter directly on an image, the actual adjustment settings can't be readjusted unless you convert the Filter to a *smart filter*. To convert the Filter to a Smart Filter, right-click to the right of the layer thumbnail (Background image or other layer) and choose Convert to Smart Object or choose Filter>Convert for Smart Filters.
- Next choose Filter>Camera Raw Filter to open the dialog which is nearly the same as Adobe Camera Raw dialog. Apply all your adjustments and click the OK button. To readjust your settings, *double-click on where it says "Camera Raw Filter"* in the Layers panel.
- Adjust the Opacity of the Camera Raw Filter: To fade the overall amount of the Camera Raw filter effect on your image, double-click on the two-slider icon to the right of where it says "Camera Raw Filter." This will bring up a dialog where you can adjust the **Opacity** and layer blending modes.





LIGHTROOM CLASSIC TIPS

How to Geotag photos when your camera doesn't have built-in GPS:

- 1st Method:
 - If your camera doesn't have built-in GPS, then take a JPEG photo using your mobile phone at the location you take your DSLR photo. Make sure you enable Location info which will automatically geo tag every photo you take with your mobile phone. If you take the photo using the Lightroom Mobile app, then the photo will be synced back to your desktop computer (Lightroom Classic). Place the Mobile Phone photo

in the same file location as the photos your imported from your DSLR camera (that do not have GPS coordinates). Photos with the GPS coordinates will be indicated by the **Photo has GPS coordinates flag** (red arrow to right). To geotag the other photos in the same folder, first click on the **Photo that has GPS coordinates flag** (red arrow to right) which will automatically open the Map Module and place a yellow pin to indicated the location on the map. Then in the Film Strip, highlight all the other photos (deselect the JPEG Mobile Phone photo with GPS coordinates) taken at or near that location. Drag and drop the photos onto the Map Module yellow pin. Now your photos are all geotagged.



 NOTE: You don't have to drop the photo(s) on the mobile phone Map Module pin. If you know you were the photo(s) was/were taken (a nearby location), then drop the photos(s) on the nearby location.

2nd Method:

- To accurately geotag your photos when you camera doesn't have a built-in GPS using a Track Log: The process is to simply record the geotags using a Mobile Phone Geotag App while you shoot that is time-synced with you camera.
- Do the following to geotag your photos:
 - 1. Install a Geo-Track app to your phone. A recommend app is *Geotag Photos Pro*.
 - 2. Sync the *camera time* with the time in your mobile phone. It's very important to ensure that the time and date in your phone matches that in the camera. For a Canon 7d Mark ii camera do the following;
 - \circ Press the <MENU> button to display the menu screen.
 - \circ Press the $< \bigcirc >$ button and select the [\checkmark] tab.
 - \circ Turn the < iii > dial to select the second [iii ii iii] tab.
 - \circ Turn the $<^{\bigcirc}>$ dial to select [Date/ Time/Zone], then press $<^{(SET)}>$.
 - Turn the < >> dial to select [Date/ Time/Zone], then press < >.
 - \circ Set the time:
 - > Turn the $\langle \bigcirc \rangle$ dial to select [Time/Zone].
 - > Press $< \stackrel{\text{(st)}}{\longrightarrow}$ so $< \stackrel{\text{(st)}}{\longrightarrow}$ is displayed.
 - > Turn the <^O> dial to select the time number, then press <^{SET}>.Turn the <^O> dial to select the desired setting, then press <^{SET}>
 - 3. Launch the Geotag Photos Pro app on your phone and leave it running silently in the background.
 - 4. Start shooting pictures with your DSLR.
 - 5. When you've finished shooting pictures, upload the recorded data track from your mobile app to the GeotagPhotos.net service or any other Cloud service (**Dropbox**, Google Drive and iCloud). If you don't have an internet connection, Geotag Photos Pro allows you to manually load the GPX file to your computer.

- Geotag your photos in Lightroom Classic: Import the photos you took into Lightroom and open the Map module. Then load the tracklog by choosing Map>Tracklog>LoadTracklog, and import the GPX file of your trip. Then, select all the photos you want to geotag and choose Map >Tracklog >Autotag.
- 7. Refer to <u>https://www.geotagphotos.net/user-guide</u> for more complete description.

Re order the Basic Panel:

- 1. Right-click any panel header in the Develop module and depress **Customize Develop Panel** of the conceptual menu.
- 2. You can also **uncheck** the box next to any panel to hide that panel from view.
- 3. Click and drag any panel up and down to create any order that suits your workflow. Normally you will sort the panels from most frequently accessed to least. In the Figure to the right, the Split Toning Panel is moved down the list.
- 4. Once you've arranged the panels to your liking, click the **Save button** at the bottom. You'll be prompted to re-launch Lightroom for the change to take effect.
- If you ever change your mind, just right-click one of the panel headers again and open the Customize Develop Panel dialog back up. At the bottom is the **Default Order** button that will put the panels back the way they were before.


