

So now, with all that info, load up and go!

Turn-in deadline is the May 21st meeting. Entries will \underline{not} be accepted at the June 4th meeting. Identify each slide with your name and category, and submit them in a $\underline{slide\ box}$ with your name.

Slides you already have are eligible. However, do not re-enter slides from last year's scavenger program.

Judgment time will be the June 4th meeting. Every club member present will have a score sheet and will score every slide on a scale of 3 to 9.

The scores will be tabulated for presentation at a subsequent meeting, and awards will be presented to each category winner and the over-all top-scoring winner.


