Pat Backer and Dan Griffith are displaying prints at the Cider Barrel restaurant in Oak Glen through December, including a reception on Dec. 2. As if that weren't enough, **Dan** also had an exhibit in Palm Springs on Nov. 10 and 11.

**Phil Dunham** has mounted an exhibit of his work in the gathering area gallery of the Redlands First United Methodist Church. It'll be on display there through Nov. 29, with a reception scheduled for Nov. 18 from 2 to 4 p.m. The church is at the corner of Olive and Cajon.

The club continues to attract new members, and I look forward to getting to know each of them better over the months ahead. One of the most important reasons for the club's success and growth is our willingness to help each other learn and grow in photography, so we should all be outgoing in welcoming these new members at meetings and other club functions. Every new member represents untold potential in what he or she brings to the club as a whole, and boundless opportunities to us as individuals for teaching, learning and friendship.

At the Nov. 5 meeting, a discussion began about how to deal with digital images in future competitions. This subject may need considerable thought to yield the wisest solution, so it'll come up again. Your input will be valuable!

Recent tragic world events have changed many facets of life as we know it. How we handle film in transit, although decidedly a minor issue among the concerns of the day, is one facet in which changes can have serious effects. Enhanced airport security will increase the possibility of X-ray damage to high-speed films, so requesting hand inspection continues to be advised. To facilitate the process, be sure your individual 35mm rolls are in clear (or at least translucent) canisters and all the rolls are in plastic zip-type bags. If, in spite of your sincere pleading for hand inspection, security personnel insist on X-raying your film, it probably won't hurt low and medium speed types (up to ISO 400) to be zapped a couple of times. Lead pouches may seem to be a good defense against X-rays, but anything which shields contents from viewing may just prompt the X-ray technician to "turn up the juice".

When mailing unprocessed film, authorities' plans to use irradiation technology to scan mail in transit may be a serious threat. Film that's been exposed and not yet processed (containing "latent images") is in the most delicate state of its life, and thus more subject to damage from the hazards of a cruel world. There's much to be learned about this new potential threat, but until we can be more certain. I won't be sending any film to processing labs by U. S. Mail. UPS and FedEx have said they don't plan to irradiate parcels, so either seems a safer bet for now. Unlike typical X-ray exposure, the irradiation planned by the Postal Service would likely ruin all films passing through it, regardless of packaging. Forewarned is forearmed!

#### JACK'S RAMBLINGS Jack Kruse

**About four months** prior to taking a class in composition and lighting, I purchased a Nikon N90s camera. During the class, one of our assignments was to include ourselves in the picture and do some self-portraits. With this new camera, I wasn't too familiar with the self-timer functions. The picture I decided to do was to be taken by placing the camera in my mail box and have me looking into the box. So! With the lens set at 28 mm, focus at three feet, and f22 aperture, my first problem was that I had a hard time getting my hand in the mail box and pushing the shutter release button. After a few attempts and some click sounds the results were zero.

**OK.** Let's read the instructions. In order to start the self-timer it requires pushing two buttons at the same time (self-timer and shutter). This is the only camera I own that operates this way. Now things were worse. I could not get the camera and both of my hands in the mail box. Solution – using the sidewalk as my gray card I fired off the camera and quickly placed it in the mail box. I couldn't see the red light signal, so I pulled the camera out. Then, with a click sound, I took the most beautiful picture of my right shoulder and ear with an excellent blue sky for background. My lens shade had blocked me from seeing the signal light. Off with the shade, and, finally I got the picture. I really learned a lesson. I encourage all to try some pictures like this. It is good training and makes you really understand your camera.

What an unexpected surprise when I met Walt Ferar, a pilot / photographer, last week. He works for Aerial Images. One of the things they do is to use a remote helicopter that he built that has a 5 ft. rotor and carries a Canon 35 mm camera. The camera mount design uses a gyro stabilization and can produce excellent 20" x 30" prints. We were talking also about digital cameras. He states they do not have the resolution for these large prints. He did purchase a Minolta Dimage 7 which has a 5.2 Megapixel count. He showed me this camera and I liked its features and light weight. It has a street price of about \$1400. For more info, visit his web site at www.skyeyephoto.com.

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
