RANDOM THOUGHTS FROM THE EDITOR

- Most of us join camera clubs (I belong to four) for two reasons: To improve our photographic skills; and to enjoy the camaraderie of fellow photographers both in discussions and during photo shoots.
- Field trips are good ways to accomplish both. In discussions during photo shoots, we learn things we didn't know, or have issues clarified that we were a bit "cloudy" on. During the shooting, we watch and learn from others: maybe they show you an angle or a subject you hadn't considered on your own; or maybe they demonstrate the benefits of "working the subject".
- Competitions are another great way to improve your photography. By evaluating the images that scored higher than yours, you can begin to incorporate some of the techniques that caused those higher scores composition, focal point of the image, editing, etc.
- To prepare an image for competition, get feedback during a Members' Night; apply that information, then enter the revised image in the competition. In this way, issues you hadn't noticed or didn't think were that important will be resolved before the judges see it. Voila! Improved image; improved score!
- I'm assuming here, but I think most Apprentice photographers are looking to improve their photography. If so, I encourage more to enter our competitions. Did you know that 8 entered our last Digital Competition and 11 entered this month's Print Competition? Now I don't know how many Apprentice photographers are in the club, but I suspect these entrants are a relatively small percentage of them. So Apprentices, at our next competition, please join in! Field trips, too, when your schedule allows.

THE VIEW FROM HERE

"The question is not what you look at but what you see." Henry David Thoreau

"What you see"? What's Thoreau talking about? Could it be that two people looking at the world see different worlds? Do our cameras see what we see? Our club's scavenger hunts have definitely proven that we each see the world differently. Given the same list of topics and the same area to explore, it's amazing how many different interpretations are presented to us as we share our results. If you are now wondering if you missed a scavenger hunt lately, the answer is no. I just want to discuss the importance of training ourselves to be better observers of the world around us so that we become better photographic artists.

Most of us can see in the conventional sense, but many of us haven't developed the skills to see in the creative sense. As with any skill, it takes practice and thoughtful exercise to begin to look around what may be an "ordinary" scene and look for the elements that will inspire you to create something unique and artistic.

Photography is about light, pattern, color, texture, point of view, etc. However, our cameras see things in two dimensional representations of a moment in time, and lack the sense of presence and the physical ambiance that we experience of "being there". We must gain both the creative skills and the technical skills to create images that evoke the desired impact in the viewers' minds.

Practice looking around you for the big picture, the details, the humor, and oh yes, remember to turn around and look behind you, as there's a whole different world hiding behind your back. Look for the opportunity to create images that evoke laughter, sadness, anger, pride, wonder, or another intense emotion. Frame your images to include what is critical to your message and be aware of elements that you want to exclude.

Creativity doesn't begin when you press the shutter, nor does it end there. The modern tools we have to post-process our images give us unlimited ways to enhance them to more fully convey the idea, message, or emotion we wish to express.

Photography is an art that we all enjoy and can excel at. As we become better skilled at seeing and creating, we also become more skilled in the ability to see and capture special moments around us. These moments, in snapshots, will more fully catch the emotions we wish to preserve, even if just for ourselves. So, whether you want to become the next Ansel Adams, or just capture your family's journey through life, truly see and enjoy the world that surrounds you.

Adjustments in Elements 8, 9, CS4, & CS5

Photoshop Elements (versions 8 and 9) incorporates some changes that are similar to those found in Photoshop CS4 & CS5, including the use of an Adjustments panel rather than individual dialog boxes for each adjustment.

This provides a central area where adjustment controls can be manipulated, and also enables a workflow without a dialog box that must be dismissed before you perform another task.

With prior versions you would need to click OK to accept the adjustment, or Cancel to cancel the adjustment, before you could perform most other tasks.

With this new approach, there's no sense of being "finished" with an adjustment. Simply perform any task you'd like, including refining an adjustment, by clicking it and adjusting the controls in the Adjustments panel.

The work must be yours, a current member of RCC. It must be ready to hang using wire eyes & wire;

no saw tooth hangers.

You may use a frameless presentation.

Your name, title of the picture, and sale price (if for sale) must be on the back.

There is a \$3.00 fee for each work hung: cash or check.

Work left for another hanging will be charged again.

Work removed but not retrieved after a new hanging will be charged a \$3.00 storage fee.

Work unclaimed within 60 days of removal will be considered abandoned and become the property of Redlands Camera Club for disposal or sale at its sole discretion.

Image Size: no smaller than 1280 pixels on the long side

File Format: jpg or jpeg

File Size: less than 3.5 mb (3,500 kb)

Image Title: (example) Blue Sky (normal capitalization, spaces, punctuation)

File Name: bluesky

(no capitalization, spaces, punctuation) SaveAs: bluesky in .jpg format; it will automatically become "bluesky.jpg"

June Field Trip to San Juan Capistrano Mission

Our June field trip will be to San Juan Capistrano Mission on Saturday, June 25th. We will photograph interesting architectural details of the current mission and museum, and the antique walls and bell towers of the original mission. There are beautiful gardens, two lily ponds with swimming koi, and the museums have items of historic interest. Tickets for entrance are \$9 general admission, \$8 for seniors. They may be purchased online or at the door. The address of the mission is 26801 Ortega Highway, San Juan Capistrano; (949) 234-1300.

We will travel by Metrolink train, either from San Bernardino or Downtown Riverside (your choice). The train we should be sure to get leaves SB at 8:55 am and Riverside at 9:15 am. We will arrive at SJC at 10:41 am. The mission is easy walking distance from the train stop. Our return train will leave SJC at 5:03, arrive in RIV at 6:29 and SB at 7:00 pm. This is the only weekend train at this time of year for these locations, so it will be important to arrive early for our trains. The roundtrip fare from SB is \$25.50 general and \$13 seniors; RIV fare is \$22.50 general, \$11.50 seniors.

This will be a long day of shooting and summer relaxation. After we're done at the mission, we can explore the surrounding area, and eat lunch in the many local restaurants. We can photograph the historic Los Rios district, easy walking distance across the railroad tracks from the mission. It has unique homes, shops and restaurants to explore. Last time we did this, it was fun taking the train (seeing the bumper-to-bumper traffic on the 91), and not having to worry about driving.

Be aware that whatever equipment you bring, you will be carrying it the whole time we are there, so pack light if you wish. Tripods are allowed. We can do "personal photography" at the mission without extra payment or permits. (We don't want to say or suggest we are doing commercial photography, as it is much more expensive and restricted!) Turning the Background layer into a regular layer (Photoshop & Elements)

By default, the Background layer is locked and you can't move it. But if you want or need to do so, you can quickly change it to a regular layer that is both unlocked and movable.

Simply double-click on the word Background in the Layers Panel.

A dialogue box will appear with "Layer 0" in the name box. You can either leave it as such, or rename it. It now has all the properties and flexibilities of a regular layer.
