Prez Sez

Thanks to all of you that have been pitching in and helping with the chair and table set up before our meetings and take down after the meetings. Your help is truly appreciated.

Our recent competition, with judge critiques, appears to be a great success. A straw vote of the audience at the end of the competition indicated an overwhelming appreciation of the process. The critiques should be of benefit for both the image maker as well as for the rest of the audience

Although our three competitions a year appear to be one competition, they are <u>each</u> really three competitions blended together. The Apprentice, Intermediate and Advanced Classes are all judged together, but the ribbons are awarded separately. The audience, as well as the judges, do not know which class the image is in. Each image is judged on its own merits; however, the image is in competition for ribbons only with other images in the same class. Thus an image that has only a modest score, but is in the Apprentice class, may well win a 1st place ribbon. The Best of Show is the top scoring image and is awarded before the ribbons for the various classes are awarded.

Those who consider themselves as apprentice or intermediate photographers are encouraged to submit images to the competitions. You have just as good a chance of earning a ribbon as do the advanced photographers. Competition is more than just showing off. The ribbons are more than just bragging rights. The process of competing for ribbons encourages you to hone your skills and improve your photography in general. For all of us, looking at the winners gives us ideas as to how to improve our own photography.

Remember our table on the north side of the meeting room. This is a place to share images for ideas for improving the images (or just showing off) as people pass by and chat with you about the image.

Seek and Destroy Rogue Pixels

After extracting, (or copying, pasting, erasing, selecting, etc.) part of an image using a layer mask, it's easy to accidentally leave stray pixels lying around.

To make them easy to identify for deletion, apply a *Stroke layer style* to the layer (Layer>Layer Style>Stroke).

Use the default settings, but click the color swatch and select a bright color (such as red, unless your image contains a lot of that color).

Now, any rogue pixels will be ringed in that bright color and stand out for easy clean-up.

Delete or Format? (excerpted from Ask Tim Grey eNewsletter July 4, 2012)

Question: Is it better to format the media card in your camera each time you empty it, rather than just deleting? **Answer:** It is <u>absolutely better</u> to reformat your digital media card <u>in the camera</u> rather than simply deleting the images through any other means (whether in the camera or via your computer through a card reader).

Besides effectively deleting the images from the card in order to clear space for new images, formatting the card <u>in the camera</u> also recreates the "table of contents" (the file allocation table) for the card, helping to minimize the risk of file corruption.

It is not absolutely necessary to reformat the card every time you delete all images, but reformatting is a very convenient way to clear the card, and it includes the extra potential benefit of reducing the risk of corruption.

WEBMASTER

Starting with the most recent competition (Summer 2012) you will be able to download a video slideshow of the winners. Just go to the menu bar: Competitions > Competition Awards > Digital > 2012 > Summer 2012 > Download Winner Videos. Select the video you want and click on it to download. The video files are in the .ZIP compressed format and will have to be unzipped before they can be seen. Simply double click on the ZIP file and follow the instructions.

Starting with the month of June, the *Featured Photographers* page will feature a video slide show of the images as well as the individual images. This slide show is an embedded copy of the original, which is on *YouTube*. If you, as the *Featured Photographer*, do not wish to have the slide show on your page or on *YouTube*, please let me know and I will remove it.

Make an Action in Photoshop or Elements

If you need to make the same adjustment to a set of pictures, your best bet is to make an Action, then run it on the images. You can record a set of tasks, then play back the Action to apply them to any image. This is a great tool for re-sizing a series of images, applying the same Curves adjustment to a whole shoot, and more.

To make an Action, go to *Windows > Actions*.

Click on the *New Action* button and name it (for example "resize 8x10 horiz"). The red *Record* button will automatically be set to ON, so open your image and begin your tasks.

Everything you do from the point when you saw the red record button will be part of your Action.

Click on the *Stop* button when you've completed all the tasks you want included.

To run the Action on other images, just open the new image(s), click on the *Action* tab (it's included in the *Layers Palette*), highlight the Action you want, press *Play*, sit back and watch!

FIELD TRIPS

Our annual Scavenger Hunt will take place on Saturday, August 18th, at Venice Beach in Los Angeles. In case you have not participated in one of our Scavenger Hunts before, they are much fun and a challenge to your creativity and photographic skills. We will meet at a designated time and place; the list of items to be sought and photographed will be handed out, and then you are on your own to find subjects to meet the list categories. Take as many images as you wish, but we will submit our "one best" in each category to be shown in our RCC meeting on September 3rd.

Venice Beach area includes the beach, boardwalk, sports areas, Muscle Beach, the pier, and we will be including the canal areas of Venice. The area is filled with performers, sports events, beachgoers, all kinds of craziness, businesses, eateries, the ocean, the pier, and anything else you can imagine, plus a bit more. There should be lots to see and shoot, and should be a lot of fun.

We will be meeting at the parking lot at the end of Venice Blvd, at Ocean Walk. Warning: in summer, parking may be as much as \$15, so carpooling is suggested to defray costs. Also, parking fills up early, so it is recommended that we get there early to be sure we can all park in the same lot, for convenience in handing out the list. There is no other cost to being at the beach, other than anything you wish to buy or eat. However, it is suggested that we take some \$1 bills in our pockets, to pay as donations to some of the performers that we shoot. This is not mandatory, but this is how they make a living, and if we are enjoying and shooting their talents and skills, it is appropriate to pay a little for this.

Venice Beach is almost 85 miles from Redlands, and will take an hour and a half or a bit more. If we go early, traffic should not be a problem. The aim is to be at the parking lot by around 8:00 am, with the lists to be handed out between 8:00-8:45 am. The meeting spot is by the ocean walk at the south end of the lot. To make it by this time, carpoolers should meet at Coco's in Redlands at 6:00 am, to leave by 6:15 am (sorry guys!).

Directions: Head west on the I-10 toward Los Angeles. Go 48 miles to the 605 freeway; merge onto the 605 South, go 2.8 miles; merge onto CA-60 west toward LA, 11 miles; keep left to take I-10 West toward Santa Monica; merge onto I-405 South, via exit 3-B toward Venice Blvd; right onto Sawtelle south .2; take the first left onto Venice Blvd.; follow Venice Blvd. to Oceanfront Walk, and into the parking lot.

Performance Preferences

Have you set your *Preferences* yet to tell Photoshop or Elements how to behave? If not, go to *Edit > Preferences* to do so. *Memory Usage* can let you specify how much of your available RAM to dedicate to the use of the program. Typically, 70% - 75% is a good workable range.

Once the program uses up this RAM (while performing multiple tasks such as brush work, copying and pasting, keeping things in the Undo and History buffers, etc.), the computer will go to the hard drive to write temporary data; this area of the hard drive is called the Scratch Disk.

Photoshop recommends this not be your main hard drive, but rather, another drive you may have connected.

If you don't have another drive to go to, don't fret; it's not that big a deal.

But performance can improve if you do. Create a Scratch Disk on that other drive.

While working for an extended period on a file in Photoshop or Elements, have you ever noticed performance slowing down? Maybe that's because the Undo and History buffers are now filled up and the computer is using that scratch disk.

IF you are comfortable with all the actions in your Undo, Clipboard, and History buffers, you can free up this RAM and get your speed back up.

To do this, go to *Edit* > *Purge* (Elements = *Edit* > *Clear*).

From the next flyout menu, you can select either *Undo*, *Clipboard*, *History*, or *All*, depending on your comfort level. But beware; once you click on one of these choices, that data is gone and cannot be undone!

Adjustments in Elements 8, 9, 10, CS4, & CS5

Photoshop Elements (versions 8, 9, and 10) incorporates some changes that are similar to those found in Photoshop CS4 & CS5, including the use of an Adjustments panel rather than individual dialog boxes for each adjustment.

This provides a central area where adjustment controls can be manipulated, and also enables a workflow without a dialog box that must be dismissed before you perform another task.

With prior versions you would need to click OK to accept the adjustment, or Cancel to cancel the adjustment, before you could perform most other tasks. With this new approach, there's no sense of being "finished" with an adjustment. Simply perform any task you'd like, including refining an adjustment, by clicking it and adjusting the controls in the Adjustments panel.
