
We meet at 7:00 pm on the first and third Mondays of every month at **Redlands United Church of Christ**, 168 Bellevue Avenue, Redlands, CA.

We now have quite a few affiliate links on our web site.

We just received our first check as payment for purchases made by some of our members. Thank You! It was more than expected (over \$100), so some of you are using the links.

Unfortunately, only a few of our die hard members are the ones using the links. You must click on the link on the affiliates page of our website if you want to shop at one of the listed merchants. There is a special code embedded in the link that tells the affiliate program where the referral came from.

Please consider clicking on these links if you are planning a photo or computer type of purchase. By going to these seller's web sites through our links we will be paid a small percentage of each sale. It won't be much, but at the end of the year it could wind up being a sizeable amount.

Reducing Color Noise: Reducing color noise can improve a good exposure or save others.

First, use the lowest possible ISO setting to avoid a long exposure. Next, use your RAW conversion software to reduce moderate amounts of noise. Finally, use Photoshop, Elements, or plug-in software.

It's difficult to reduce luminance (light and dark) noise without compromising image sharpness. But reducing color noise is comparatively easy, with less severe side effects (slight reductions in saturation along contours).

Step 1: Duplicate the Background layer. Change its Blend Mode to Color. Keep this layer active (highlighted).

Step 2: View the image at 100% (View > Actual Pixels); only this magnification will accurately display detail. Blur the layer (Filter > Blur > Gaussian Blur), but not too aggressively.

Using this technique, only the color is blurred, not its luminance, so sharpness remains. If you can't reduce color noise enough while retaining saturation and hues, you may need to use third-party plug-in software.

FIELD TRIPS

Our official field trip this October will be to Julian, California, on Thursday, October 4th. We will be photographing the historic mountain gold mining town, now better known for its apple orchards and apple pies. The town has places of historic interest, the old cemetery, several apple orchards, two wineries, and a variety of shops, restaurants and other businesses. As this is a mid-week trip, some of the weekend festivities of the Apple Days period may not be present. The benefit will be a less crowded town, easier parking, and a more peaceful photo shoot.

For those not available mid-week, the following weekend, the 6th and 7th, will have even more activities to photograph. The Apple Days Festival is a two day event held at the Menghini Winery, 2 miles from downtown Julian. (Some reviews of this event have been less than stellar, with suggestions that staying in town saves \$5 and has just as much/more to offer.) Either way, the weekend holds increased activities, and on Sunday there are historic reenactments by local actors.

It is free to visit the town of Julian, but be sure to bring at least enough money for a slice of delicious apple pie! There are several places for a nice lunch. Plan on walking the several blocks of this small town. If we are early enough, we may be able to park right in town. There are public restrooms.

I suggest arriving in town by 9am, and meeting in front of the historic Julian Hotel. This is not because of the hotel specifically, but it is a fairly obvious landmark. Coming into town by the directions provided, the hotel will be in the middle of town, on the right side of the street. We can head out from there and explore the area, shooting as desired. The Chamber of Commerce has an historic walking tour map/brochure. We may need to drive out of town if we wish to visit some of the working orchards.

Julian is about 115 miles from Redlands. It will take a little over 2 hours to get there. Carpoolers meet at Coco's in Redlands at 6:30 am, to leave by 6:45, for a 9 am arrival. Carpooling is referencing the Tuesday field trip only; weekenders should make their own arrangements.

Directions: Travel West on the I-10 from Redlands; take the I-215 toward Riverside; take the 60 freeway exit toward San Diego; take the I-215 south toward San Diego. Merge onto the I-15 south; about 4 miles past this point, take exit #58, for CA-79 toward Temecula Parkway, .2 mile; turn left onto CA-79 south and go 53 miles; turn left onto CA-78/ CA-79/Julian Road, 6.7 miles; turn right to stay on CA-78/79, .4 miles into the town of Julian. The hotel is on the right side of the main street.

Over-Sharpening and Sharpening Techniques

There isn't really a way to reduce the effects of over-sharpening effectively. It is recommended that you only sharpen the final output version of the image, not the original "master" image. That way you can always go back to the original and try again if you've over-sharpened. In theory you could apply a very slight blur to the image, but this would blur detail and frankly wouldn't do much to reduce the halos that are typically a result of over-sharpening. So stick with an approach where you only sharpen the final output image, so the original master image never has any sharpening artifacts.

Using a small Radius combined with a high Amount setting (in Unsharp Mask or Smart Sharpen) will help prevent visible halos, but it will also prevent you from achieving the best results for a given image. Many images won't reach their full potential with a small Radius setting. Instead, use a relatively low Radius setting (between about 0.5 and 1.0 or so) and relatively high Amount setting (between around 175% and 225% in most cases) <u>only when working with an image that contains</u> <u>relatively fine detail</u>. Use a relatively high Radius setting (between about 2.0 and 3.0) and relatively low Amount setting (between about 75% and 125%) for <u>images with primarily smooth textures</u>.

Basic Photography course is now in session. Registration is open for:

Intermediate Photography Tuesdays 6 to 9 p.m. for seven weeks, beginning Oct. 30, 2012

De-Gassing a Print

Even the latest inks contain glycol and other chemicals that vary in their evaporation times. If a print is framed behind glass before these chemicals have had a chance to fully evaporate, over time they can leave a residue on the inside of the glass, which is relatively easy to see and can distract from the appearance of the print.

To resolve this "outgassing" issue, place a sheet of absorbent paper over the print for 24 to 48 hours, replacing the sheets after 24 hours. Standard copy paper can be used for this purpose.

The paper may wrinkle due to absorbing the chemicals. After about 48 hours it is generally safe to frame the print behind glass; in areas with higher humidity you might want to allow extra time.

It isn't <u>necessary</u> to place paper over the print in the outgassing process, but it helps. If you don't, you'll need to allow more time, since the "sponge" effect will cause the gasses to escape more slowly.

Don't stack prints; doing so doesn't allow air to flow as freely and reduces the evaporation rate. Also, don't re-use the paper. The paper used as a "sponge" may wrinkle slightly and eventually the paper becomes saturated. To get the maximum benefit, use new sheets every 24 hours.
