Prepare for December's Competition

You may submit entries for our next competition via our website anytime from November 5th to the 19th.

But before you do, make sure they will appear on our large screen the way you want them to. Size them to fit the screen (remember some images that were about half-size last time?); convert them to the correct color space so some of your colors don't appear out-of-gamut; and calibrate your monitor.

When it comes to color accuracy, there are some things you should consider: RCC calibrates its laptop and projector shortly before each competition to ensure the computer is sending accurate color information and the projector is displaying it accordingly. But if your monitor is not calibrated, you may be giving the RCC computer inaccurate color data! For example, if you try to make a Pepsi can look correct but your monitor is off, the blue may seem a bit yellow; so you give it more red. Sure, it now looks right on your monitor, but other monitors will receive the message to add that red to an otherwise accurate color.

After you've calibrated, you should ensure your image's color space is the same as the one used by the projector. Most projectors (including RCC's) use the sRGB color space. If your image is in the Adobe RGB (1998) or ProPhoto RGB color space, some of the colors cannot be reproduced by the projector. You should convert the color space to sRGB to make sure all colors can be displayed accurately.

Refer to the boxes at the bottom of Page 5 for directions on converting color profiles for your images and for changing the size of your image to match the capabilities of the projector.

FIELD TRIPS

Our November field trip will be to the *Cabot Pueblo Museum* in Desert Hot Springs. This is a historic homestead built by Cabot Yerxa, an adventurer who homesteaded 160 acres. He was the one who discovered the hot springs for which Desert Hot Springs is named. He built his home in the Pueblo Indian style, honoring his Native American friends, starting when he was 60, and continued building until his death at 81. It is now a museum, includes 35 rooms, 150 windows and 65 doors, made of inventive materials. It is a great place to photograph "old stuff" in an interesting environment.

The field trip will be on Saturday, November 3rd, not Friday, as originally planned. The museum opens at 9 am, and we should be there at that time. I have confirmed that the <u>tour</u> is mostly inside, and we are not allowed to shoot inside. We are, however, welcome to shoot outside this interesting structure and in the surrounding gardens, etc. For anyone interested in taking the <u>tour</u>, which is likely of historical interest, although not for photography, the first tour is at 9:30 am, and they continue hourly throughout the day. Cost of the tour is \$11 for adults, \$9 for seniors 65 and up. The tour takes about 60 minutes.

My picture of the day is to arrive at opening, 9 am, and shooting for as long as we wish. There will be interesting rustic architectural details, and various things of historical interest. This probably isn't a long field trip, but is different from where we have been in the past, and should be fun. I imagine there will be close-up opportunities. Tripods should be OK, as we are outside; but we should be considerate of others if there are lots of visitors there when we are. For people interested in this trip, but cannot go on Saturday, the museum is open Tuesday through Sunday, 9-5.

The museum is about 50 miles from Redlands, and will take about an hour to get there. Carpoolers should meet at Coco's in Redlands at 7:45 for an 8:00 am departure.

Delete All or Format? (excerpted from Ask Tim Grey eNewsletter July 27, 2012)

Question: Is it better to format your card each time you empty it, rather than just deleting?

Answer: From my perspective it is much better to format your digital media card <u>in the camera</u> rather than simply delete the images from the card.

Granted, when things go smoothly there really isn't much of a difference between the two. But when you format the card instead of simply deleting the images from that card, you're re-initializing the card.

That means, in part, that you're creating a new "table of contents" for the card. The benefit is that you are creating a clean slate for your card, which can help prevent issues related to cumulative corruption on the card.

Over time, random errors related to that table of contents (the file allocation table) can lead to problems with the images stored on the card.

So, as much as the odds of having a problem caused by deleting rather than formatting, I do recommend that you get in the habit of formatting the card when you're ready to re-use it, rather than simply deleting all images from the card.



Redlands Camera Club School of Photography

There's a change in the Fall schedule, and it means **you still have the opportunity to get into the most fun class in our lineup: Intermediate Photography**. No classroom lectures here, it's all shooting and personalized critiquing. And the shooting happens by special arrangements in some of Redlands' most iconic places. The class, originally scheduled to start Oct. 30, has been delayed by one week and will begin on Nov. 6. (This schedule change does <u>not</u> affect the subsequent Adobe Photoshop Elements course, which still begins on Jan. 8, 2013.)

<u>Intermediate Photography</u> Tuesdays 6 to 9 p.m. for seven weeks, beginning Nov. 6, 2012

The focus in this class is entirely on creativity and improving your technical skills. The class will meet once a week at photogenic areas in Redlands for 3 hours of shooting, with an additional 3 hour session once a week to critique the photographs, for a total of 13 sessions. The shooting sessions will be scheduled at the best day and evening times for photography; the shooting schedule will be established by mutual agreement of the class members at the first class meeting on Nov. 6. The critiquing sessions will take place on Tuesday evenings, 6 to 9 p.m., in the classroom. To give each student personal attention in shooting and critiques, the class will be strictly limited to 15 students. Tuition: \$120. Pre-requisites: membership in RCC and Basic Photography or equivalent course work, at the instructor's discretion.

The remaining course in our fall semester is:

Adobe Photoshop Elements Tuesdays 6 to 9 p.m. for six weeks, beginning Jan. 8, 2013

Digital photographs offer the potential for enhancements that equal anything that could ever have been done in the traditional wet darkroom – and so much more. Using Adobe Photoshop Elements, you'll learn how to manage your growing collection of digital files and how to realize your own personal vision through the amazing power of image editing. Packed with most of the power of its "bigger brother" Photoshop, Photoshop Elements is both easier to learn and much less expensive to buy. Tuition: \$60. Textbook required, about \$30. Software: Photoshop Elements 11, about \$80. You will not need to bring a computer to class. Prerequisite: RCC membership.

Changing the Color Profile of an image

(may be required to set sRGB for RCC projection)

First, make sure that you're working with a flattened document.

Files that aren't flattened tend to create strange color shifts

when you change the profile.

<u>Photoshop</u>

Go to Edit > Convert to Profile.

Select the new color profile (sRGB) from the "Destination Space" drop-down and click **OK** to commit to your changes.

Elements

Go to Image > Convert Color Profile > Convert to sRGB Profile.

Now when you submit images for projection at RCC, the colors will look much closer to what you saw at home because most projectors (including RCC's) use only the sRGB color space.

Selective Sharpening: Photoshop and Elements 9 or higher

To draw attention to the main subject in your image, sharpen only that, leaving the rest of the image unsharpened. You usually don't want to sharpen dark and out of focus areas because that's where noise shows up the most. Sharpening increases noise.

After highlighting the appropriate Layer, go to Filter > Convert to Smart Filter. Select the Unsharp Mask and sharpen the entire image, paying attention to how it affects only the main subject. After clicking OK, select black as the foreground color; select a brush (appropriately sized) and paint out the areas of the image where sharpening is not desired.

When done, click on the image thumbnail to de-activate the Unsharp Mask.
