Limelight: Tommi Cahill, Asst. Prof. of Art, Univ. of Redlands

The speaker for April 15, 2013, will be Tommi Cahill, Assistant Professor of Art at the University of Redlands. She currently teaches courses in Beginning Photography, Digital Imaging, and Advanced Projects.

Controlling Colors when Printing (excerpted from Ask Tim Grey eNewsletter July 24, 2012)

**Question:** When using Photoshop or Elements, is it better to have Photoshop or the printer control the color of a photograph?

**Answer:** I would say that the better approach is to have Photoshop control color management in a print, but this is increasingly becoming a less critical issue in a color-managed workflow.

The most important thing when it comes to deciding whether Photoshop or your printer software will control the color of printed output is that you ensure only one or the other is actually altering the color values to ensure accurate results.

This is the issue often referred to as "double color management", where Photoshop alters the color values to compensate for the behavior of the printer, ink, and paper combination you're using, and then the printer alters those values further, resulting in an inaccurate print.

From my perspective it is best to use a high-quality printer profile for the specific printer, ink, and paper combination you're using, and to establish that as the printer profile from Photoshop, using the option to let Photoshop manage colors for you.

You then need to make sure that color management is turned off in the printer driver, so that Photoshop is in control of color management without any interference from the printer on that front.

The alternative would be to set Photoshop to let the printer manage colors, and then use the printer settings in your printer software to ensure the most accurate output. My preference is to only use this option when a high-quality printer profile isn't available, or when you feel you need to fine-tune the output because you are having a difficult time getting accurate results for certain images.

With a high-quality printer profile, you should get predictable and accurate prints consistently, provided all settings are established properly.

#### **Schedule of Classes**

#### **Intermediate Photography** Tuesdays 6 to 9 p.m. for seven weeks, beginning Apr. 2, 2013

Have a one-on-one review of your best work by one of our team of experienced photographers. Bring up to six images (on a thumb drive in JPG format, just as you'd bring them to a member's night) and sit down for a private discussion about your work and how to make it even better. What a great opportunity for constructive criticism in a comfortable, personalized setting.

#### • Lens and Camera Focus Testing

#### Have your camera body and lens(es) checked for precision focus.

Are you certain that your camera and all its lenses are focusing correctly? There is a margin of error in a camera's autofocus system; if it's out of adjustment you won't get all of the sharpness that you paid the big bucks for. RCC's precision focus calibration system will check your equipment and give you visible proof of its focusing accuracy. If your camera body has the ability to be user-adjusted (check the owner's manual), you'll be able to adjust and re-check until your focus is the best it can be. If your camera lacks this capability and isn't focusing correctly, you'll have documented proof to present to the manufacturer's repair center so they can correct the problem. If all is OK, you'll have the satisfaction of knowing that.

#### Quick Black & White images in Adobe Camera Raw

A quick way to convert digital color images to black & white is to open it in ACR (Adobe Camera Raw). In the Basic panel, move the Saturation slider all the way down (minus 100).

Slide the Temperature and Tint sliders to get the look you like. Done!

#### Understanding the Clarity Control

(excerpted from Solutions by George Jardine in the March 2013 issue of Outdoor Photographer magazine)

Digital captures frequently lack "apparent" contrast.

They can have respectable global contrast and still appear flat on screen or in print. The Clarity control increases or decreases midtone contrast and edge definition. Edge definition sometimes is called local contrast, and is likened to sharpening.

Increasing Clarity enhances image contrast and makes our photos more representative of what we saw with our own two eyes.

Decreasing Clarity softens midtone contrast and edge definition, a way to minimize wrinkles in a face or other skin blemishes.

#### Changing the Color Profile of an image

(May be required to set sRGB for RCC projection)

First, make sure that you're working with a flattened document. Files that are not flattened tend to create strange color shifts when you change the profile.

#### **Photoshop**

#### Go to **Edit > Convert to Profile**.

Select the new color profile (sRGB) from the "Destination Space" drop-down and click **OK** to commit to your changes.

#### **Elements**

#### Go to Image > Convert Color Profile > Convert to sRGB Profile.

Now when you submit images for projection at RCC, the colors will look much closer to what you saw at home because most projectors (including RCC's) use only the sRGB color space.



#### Understanding the Vibrance Control

(excerpted from Solutions by George Jardine in the March 2013 issue of Outdoor Photographer magazine)

Vibrance is a close cousin of Saturation, but different in two important ways.

Vibrance saturates only colors that need it;

Saturation moves all the colors in the spectrum up or down together.

Vibrance doesn't oversaturate reds and oranges, where most skin tones are found;
and it darkens blues and purples, where skies are found.

For landscapes, Vibrance gives a nice boost to cyans, greens, and yellows without touching oranges and reds very much.
