How is your eye? What are you looking at that makes your eye sharper and clearer? I attended the workshop on critiquing photos, and am reminded that ultimately, our eye and our vision is our own. No one else has the vision and imagination that you do. I encourage you to shoot it and share it.

But in order to share that vision most effectively, you have to overcome some technical hurdles. No one wants to look long at an image that is unintentionally blurry or out of focus, or incorrectly exposed. As the visionary/ photographer, you have to communicate through your image. If you are communicating verbally, you don't mumble or mispronounce words. All the elements that are in your image should (ideally) be in there for the purpose of conveying your vision; everything else is a distraction.

A few years ago, I took some pictures of a little waterfall in San Bernardino, trying to get the silk water effect. I was there early in the morning, shooting as the sun was coming up so I could get the long exposure time necessary. When I was looking at the shots later, I found that there was someone's leftover shoes in the shots! I had missed it when shooting, but I absolutely cloned it out later. I could have left the shoes in and the picture would still have told a story; but it wouldn't have been the story I wanted to tell.

What is your vision for the picture you are taking? Is it the right clouds, light, season, framing, exposure, lens, perspective to convey the vision you have? In your editing software, are you removing the distractions and properly emphasizing the center of interest, while de-emphasizing everything else? You can pump up the contrast, increase the saturation, increase the brightness, increase the sharpness, and probably 20 other techniques to draw the eye to where you want it to look to see your vision. Are you using them?

Look at the images in our competition and see the techniques those other visionaries used to try to convey their message, and see the ones that seem to be effective. Make those a part of your photographic toolkit, and make your vision clearer.



Photography Classes Announced

The Redlands Camera Club School of Photography announces its schedule of classes for the Spring 2014 semester:

Introduction to Photographic Image Editing, IE 101

The basics of using a computer to store, manage and enhance digital images, using Adobe Photoshop Elements 12. Classroom time will consist of discussion and demonstrations; each student will then use the same digital images outside of class time on their own computer to complete assignments. Step-by-step instructions for each assignment are provided in the textbook, *Adobe Photoshop Elements 12 Classroom in a Book*, about \$35.

Tuesdays from Mar. 4 to 18, 6 to 9 p.m. Prerequisites: none. Tuition: \$30. Textbook: see above

Introduction to Adobe Photoshop Lightroom, IE 105

While it is not a complete image editing program, Lightroom offers extensive capabilities to manage, access and optimize digital photographs. It is usually used in conjunction with Adobe Photoshop or other image editing software, and can bring greater efficiency to the user's workflow. Classroom time will consist of discussion and demonstrations; each student will then use the same digital images outside of class time on their own computer to complete assignments. Step-by-step instructions for each assignment are provided in the textbook, *Adobe Photoshop Lightroom 5 Classroom in a Book*, about \$35. Some experience with digital photography and image editing is desirable, but not required.

Tuesdays from Apr. 1 to 15, 6 to 9 p.m. Prerequisites: none. Tuition: \$30. Textbook: see above

Intermediate Digital Photography, PH 102

The follow-on class to Introduction to Digital Photography, this course covers the fundamentals of lenses; modifying light through exposure and filters; understanding color; why tripods can be important; and more advanced camera techniques.

Field Photographic Techniques, PH 201

This course consists of an introductory classroom meeting and 3 field shooting sessions, each of which is followed by a classroom critique of that week's student photographs. Field sessions will be in photogenic locations in and around Redlands, on days and at times arrived at by mutual agreement of the class members. Students will photograph a variety of subject matter in differing lighting conditions, putting into practice the principles learned in earlier lecture and discussion courses. Because of the extensive one-on-one coaching involved, enrollment is limited to 15 students.

Tuesdays from May 27 to Jun. 17, 6 to 9 p.m., and 3 field shooting sessions at times and dates by mutual arrangement. Prerequisites: *PH 101* and *PH 102* (or equivalent, with instructor's permission). Tuition: \$70. Textbook: none

All classes will be taught by Certified Professional Photographer Frank Peele. Redlands Camera Club (RCC) membership is required for registration; dues are \$25 per year and allow taking multiple courses. Noise Reduction: Photoshop filter, RAW, Lightroom

Question: I'm using Photoshop to process of my images. I notice there are noise reduction options in Adobe Camera Raw as well as through a filter in Photoshop. Does it matter which of these two options I use?


Answer: There is a significant difference. In the case of Photoshop, I highly recommend applying noise reduction in Adobe Camera Raw during the RAW conversion process, rather than after the conversion using the Reduce Noise filter. The reason for this has to do with the quality of the its noise reduction.

The Lightroom Develop module and Adobe Camera Raw are essentially the same. There are differences in the interface, but the actual adjustments available and the math behind those adjustments are the same.

Also, with recent versions of Lightroom, I've become increasingly happy with the noise reduction available in the Develop module. In early versions of Lightroom, I still prefer the use of third-party plug-ins for noise reduction. Now, as far as I'm concerned Lightroom is as good as (or in some respects perhaps better than) those third-party plug-ins. The recent addition of the Smoothness slider raises the value of noise reduction in Lightroom or Adobe Camera Raw.

For images where noise is only a minor concern, I wouldn't worry too much about where you fit noise reduction into your workflow. But for images that require attention to noise reduction, I recommend using the powerful capabilities of Lightroom or Adobe Camera Raw rather than later in my image-optimization workflow.

MEMBERS' GALLERY 2013 Fall Digital Competition: 2nd Place Ribbons



Printing at Costco (excerpted from Ask Tim Grey eNewsletter January 3, 2014)

Question: I use Lightroom's *Export to JPEG* to print at Costco. Instead, I used Photoshop's *Save As*, and when I picked up the prints, I noticed a drastic muting of the colors. I went back to Lightroom, *Exported to JPEG* and had Costco print again; this time the colors came out as they should have. My Lightroom *External Edit for Photoshop Color Space* is set to ProPhotoRGB. PhotoShop is set to sRGB IEC61966. Would this have caused the loss/shift of color?

Answer: Yes, indeed, the color space would certainly create this issue. The core problem is that the ProPhoto RGB color space is a huge color space, so when the values of ProPhoto RGB get mapped without proper conversion to sRGB, the saturation will be reduced significantly.

There is no problem with using Photoshop to process an image for printing at Costco. You simply need to convert the image to a more appropriate color space before saving. It is generally safe to convert to the sRGB color space for this type of printing by choosing *Edit > Convert to Profile* from the menu, and selecting sRGB as the destination profile.
