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Prez Sez

The other day I stopped by the Redlands Art Association for Marge Beasley's show and reception. Marge is a very talented local photographer, known for her gorgeous images of Redlands landmarks. She also produces a nice calendar every year that makes a great gift, especially for someone who grew up in Redlands but now lives far away. (Marge didn't pay me for that endorsement, but I did take a cookie from the snack table.) Other than Marge's wonderful photographs, one thing that struck me about the show was the other art on display in the gallery and all around her work. Redlands artists are hard at work producing paintings in a variety of media, as well as drawings, sculpture, pottery, and even jewelry. They confirm that good photographs are as much art as many other means of expression.

When pushing Marge's show at a recent meeting, I made a joke about photographers not being "real artists." That got a laugh, a few groans, and at least one call for impeachment. Like most artists, we can be a little sensitive about our art, but I made my point – we are artists. Granted, our brushes don't look like paint brushes (We call them "tools," instead.) and we call our pallet knives "filters," but we are artists all the same.

When most people think of great artists, names such as Rembrandt, Michelangelo, and Vermeer come to mind. They used various substances smeared on paper or ceilings to represent reality, or their interpretation of it. Then names such as Picasso, Mondrian, and Dali sneak in there to really mess things up. I add the last three to emphasize that an artist doesn't have to exactly duplicate reality to make art. What the artist has to do is make us understand how he or she feels about the subject. So if he adds a cloud or paints out a blemish, or makes the scene brighter than it really was, it's still art.

As photographers we are artists. We may not take as long to produce a work, although with the hours I spend in front of my monitor, my wife may not agree. It may be less expensive to be a photographer, but costs of gear, software, printing, matting, and framing may move us well ahead of the competition.

When a painter decides to put scene to canvas, the first step is to decide what to paint. This may involve several sketches at various times of light, or even, perish the thought, a photograph. We do the same with test shots or multiple exposures. We may even refer to a famous painting of the scene or try to mimic the lighting of a noted portrait artist. The painter doesn't always stay on location to finish the work, but returns to the studio to fine tune the results. We start up Adobe or other products and do our own fine tuning with our brush tools and filters.

As we did back in the old color slide days, you can attempt to capture that perfect shot and display it right out of the camera. But in the current world of digital artistry, you don't have to be that limited. Get the best shot you can (or better yet a whole bunch of them) and then head for the studio (computer) to be the artist you truly are.

Lessons from New York's Street Photographers



The documentary film Everybody Street, released in 2013, illuminates the lives and work of 15 top New York street photographers. Film maker Cheryl Dunn captures these bold (and often intrusive!) shooters at work as they discuss their methods and motivations. Wading through crowded sidewalks, wandering the back streets, riding the subways and beyond – one photographer seems to almost assault his subjects, while another asks every subject for permission. Gangsters with guns, matrons with poodles, cops and criminals, young and old, these street storytellers cover it all, sometimes at considerable risk to themselves. Note: Expect a bit

of profane language and street talk during the 80-minute film.

Night Sky, Milky Way and Exotic Creatures

Combined Field Trip and Workshop to Borrego Springs on Sunday, June 5, 2016



Join us for a fun-filled trip to Borrego Springs on June 5 to experience the beauty of the Milky Way and the amazing 130 full-sized metal sculptures inspired by creatures that roamed this same desert millions of years ago. The artworks range from prehistoric mammals to historical characters, fanciful dinosaurs, and a 350-foot-long fanciful serpent (above). The artist behind these amazing creatures, Ricardo Breceda, brings life to his sculptures by capturing each in motion. For more about these fascinating works of art, click here.

To get really ready for this trip, we're going to have a class beforehand. "Light Painting and Shooting the Night Sky" will take place on Monday, May 23, from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. in our usual meeting room at Redlands First Presbyterian Church. Like the field trip/workshop, the class is free to RCC members

in good standing. Advance registration is required for the class and/or the trip to Borrego Springs; details are below. All who register will get detailed information as the dates draw near.

Here are some things to consider:

It's about a two-hour drive from Redlands to Borrego Springs. Because it's much easier to view the sculptures in daylight, we'll do a windshield tour of the various sites at 3:00 p.m. Then we'll meet for dinner at a very good local restaurant at 5:30. At 8:00 we'll meet with late-comers before heading off to the various sculptures for the night's photography. Carpooling is suggested, as there is limited room for vehicles around the sculptures. Carpools will be made up at the 8:00 meeting, based on which sculptures folks want to photograph first. Some members are staying overnight in Borrego Springs; if you're interested in staying over, here's a link that's useful: http://tinyurl.com/oqz2zlk. We'll probably finish shooting sometime in the wee hours before dawn. Those not staying in the area will then return home. Caution: shooting all night will be exhausting. A two-hour drive home in the predawn hours with no sleep will severely test the driver's abilities!

This trip is designed for all RCC members, regardless of your level of experience. The best ways to be prepared for such a bucket-list experience? Know your equipment inside and out. Practice operating camera controls in dark conditions. Attend the classroom session. Then practice in the dark some more.

- 1. Whether you'll be attending the classroom session, the workshop/field trip, or both.
- 2. The time you'll be joining the group on Sunday, June 5: at 3:00 p.m. for the daylight tour of the sculptures, <u>5:30</u> for dinner, or <u>8:30</u> to choose locations and begin setting up for photography.
- 3. Whether you're staying overnight in the Borrego Springs area, what hotel and which night(s).
- 4. Your cell phone number(s).








RCC Featured Photographer - June 2016







Back-Screening Images in Lightroom By John Williams

Back-screening is a popular method of taking a full color image and lightening it dramatically so you can easily put readable text over it and add a smaller inset photo on top of it so will stand out. You start in the Develop module but finish in the Print Module where you can save your image as a

JPEG file and then re-import.


- In the Develop Module, go the Tone Curve panel. Grab the bottom left corner point of the diagonal Curve and drag straight upward. The higher you drag the curve vertically, the more pronounced the back-screened (washout appearance) effect will become.
- Then open the Print Module and scroll down to the Page module. Turn on the Checkbox for Identity Plate. Now click the triangle located in right corner of the Identity Plate preview. From the pop-up menu choose Edit to bring up the Identity Plate Editor.
 - Enter your text and font. As a recommendation, use Bickham Script Pro for a nice script font. For a special affect use all-lowercase letters. Tip: It's surprisingly hard to format text inside the Identity Plate Editor window. A workaround is to create your text somewhere else that has nice typographic controls, then select and copy your text into memory. Then paste the text (Ctrl+V) into the Identity Plate editor which will maintain your font and layout styles. Note: PC users cannot



To change the color of the font, click on the color box to the right of the font size box. A
dialog will appear allowing you to select a color



- When you click the "OK" button in the Identity Plate Editor, it adds your text to the center of the image. Click on the text to bring up the bounding box around the text and drag the text to a different location. To increase the test size, click on a bounding box corner control point and drag out or move the **Scale** slider to the right.
- To change the color of the text after you clicked the Identity Plate Editor, check the Override Color box and then click on the color box which will bring up the Override Color box allowing you to choose a color. To select a color from the image, click and drag the eyedropper out of the box and over the image and click on a color.




- You can insert a photo on top of another photo using the Print Module's Custom Package feature.
- Now save your work as a JPEG file (change **Print to** in the **Print Job** section to **JPEG**).
 Reimport the JPEG file into Lightroom.
- To insert a smaller size photo over your back screening image, and then add your test as described above, do the following:
 - Make sure your Back Screening image (without any text) and the image you want to insert on top of your back screening image are showing in the filmstrip. If both photos are in different folders, add the photos to a Collection. Open the Print Module.

Create a template:

One of the quickest ways to is to click on the Custom Overlay x3 Landscape template.

The new template will have four layouts. Click on the small top right template box and depress the **Backspace key** to delete it. Click on the center template and delete it as well.

 If Rulers is selected (under the Rulers, Grid and Guides section), you will be able to determine other overall size of your page (i.e., 8x10). Click the Page Setup button at the bottom of the left side panels to select other sizes.



- Drag your back-screened image from the filmstrip into the large cell.
- Grab the edges of your background image and drag each of the edges to the paper edge.
- Then right-click on the smaller cell and choose any of the following options.

Send to Back
Send Backwards
Send Forwards
Send to Front
Rotate Cell
Delete Cell
Match Photo Aspect Ratio
Anchor Cell

- Drag the insert image from the Filmstrip into the smaller cell. Then drag the cell to any other location and resize (click on cell and move edges in/out) to your liking.
- Lastly, add your custom text to the image using the procedures described above using the Identity Plate.
- NOTE: Your printer will dedicate the maximum size for your image (for many it will be an 8x10 sheet). To print a larger photo using a Photo Lab and saving your image as a JPEG, TIFF or PSD, import your Back-Screened and Inset images into Photoshop from Lightroom. Then use the Transform tool and Move tool to adjust the size and placement of your inserted image. Finally use the Horizontal Text tool to add your text.
