### Why You Should Enter Image Competitions – and How to Win

October 15, 2018

Looking for the secret to becoming the best photographer you can be? Of course there are no magic potions, no shortcuts in this pursuit. But there is one well-proven way to jump-start your success: entering your photographs in competition. In this engaging program, successful competitor and seasoned image competition judge Frank Peele will teach you what makes a winning image and how to elevate your own work by entering the arena of competition. We'll look at winning images and discuss why they won. We'll also analyze how other images, which didn't quite win, could have been improved by their makers.

So you can better understand the competition process, Frank will illustrate what trained judges go through to evaluate each image and give it a score. He will also point out the role of digital image editing in today's competitions, and how a few simple additions to your existing workflow can increase your chances of success.

You'll be able to relate to Frank's journey from would-be winner to sought-after judge. Like many shooters, his earliest competition entries didn't score as highly as he at first thought they should. He learned to take honest critiques to heart and use their lessons on his way to becoming the Inland Empire Commercial Photographer of the Year and Inland Empire Professional Photographer of the Year (both earned multiple times) and the California Scenic Photographer of the Year. As his way of paying it forward, he now judges image competitions throughout the state – for photo-enthusiast groups and professional photography guilds. He also teaches classes and workshops in image competition success, like this event on October 15.



Frank Peele shot his first commercial photographic assignment at the age of 13, using his dad's 4 x 5 inch Speed Graphic press camera and flashbulbs. A successful 30-year career as a U. S. Navy photographer and photographic officer followed, after which he established a practice in commercial, aerial and fine art photography. He became active in regional, state and national photographic guilds. His successes in competition in these organizations earned him the designation of Certified Professional Photographer and the degree of Photographic Craftsman. In 2013 he became the sixtieth person inducted into the Professional Photographers of California Hall of Fame since its establishment in 1980. He was the first person inducted into the Inland Empire Professional Photographers and Videographers Hall of Fame when it was established in 2013.



### ---<u>Adobe Lightroom and Photoshop for Photographers</u> --Nov 2018

Classes held: Tuesdays Nov6, 13, 20, 20186:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Presented by John Williams.

Course Description: This is an intermediate level Lightroom and Photoshop knowledge course and we will dive deeper into more advanced processing skills. The course begins by reviewing Lightroom's Develop module to post-process your images, including Cropping (competition judges

number one critique item), Print module and processing dark photos (No Light, No Problem). The Photoshop portion of the course will cover making selections to change colors, reducing noise when shooting high ISO night photos, Color Luminosity masking to enhance colors, Color Grading, adding a spot of light/vignette using a radial gradient, Artistic (Stylize/Creative) processing using Lookup Tables (LUT's), oil painting, changing your photo to a grayscale (Black & White) image, and Portrait retouching including Frequency Separation. Support photos, files and materials are included for this course. The handout will sufficiently cover all the topics presented. Two additional instructors (Carl Detrow and Dave Ficke) will provide over-the-shoulder instruction.

Tuition:\$30. No Textbook required. Practice photos on an USB drive and a 50-page handout which outlines step-by-step procedures will be provided.

Prerequisites for Course: Attendees need to have completed the Photoshop and Lightroom Classic CC basic courses or have a working knowledge of Lightroom's Library and Develop modules as well as a basic understanding of Photoshop. Also you must have a good working knowledge of your computer, operating systems, using a mouse, keyboard, standard menus and commands. This is a hands-on workshop where you will learn by doing so you are highly encouraged to bring your own laptop computer to the class with Lightroom Classic CC and Photoshop CC 2018 installed (not mandatory if you use an older version). If you don't have a laptop computer, the instructor will accommodate you so you can learn the procedures/techniques presented.

Time/Location: Class sessions are held from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. at Redlands First Presbyterian Church (100 Cajon St., Redlands, CA), in the courtyard classroom immediately adjacent to our main Redlands Camera Club meeting room and restrooms. ### **The S4C Competition Year has Started**

The September/October competition is now open (Sept. 22). Images can be entered through October 6<sup>th</sup>. Judging will take place on October 13<sup>th</sup>. The results are usually announced within one week of the judging. S4C has made some changes in competition rules this year which include sizing your images for entry , a standing scale for judging images (rather than a "curve" scale) and expansion of some definitions. Additionally, an advanced category –AAA

has been established. These changes are in alignment with changes made by the Photographic Society of America. Remember, there is no charge for participating in the competitions so give it a try. ### **Understanding the Exposure Triangle**

Getting the correct exposure to any photo requires an understanding of the Exposure Triangle - ISO, Aperture and Shutter Speed. ISO is the measurement setting which affects the sensitivity of your sensor. Similar to the old days of film when you could select 50, 100, 400 or 800 speed film. The higher the number, the more sensitive to light and able to shoot in lower light. And just like the old film days, the higher the ISO, the more possibility of having "noise" show up in your photos. It is best to always shoot at the lowest possible ISO setting for the conditions you are shooting in. 100 to 200 ISO is usually the lowest settings for most cameras. Going from 100 to 200 will double the sensitivity to light. Digital cameras today can usually handle a pretty high ISO without creating "noise" and some

"noise" can often be eliminated or corrected in post processing, up to a point.

Aperture is the f-Stop setting, f-4, f-8, f-22. This primarily affects the Depth of Field, how much area is in sharp focus, by controlling how much the shutter diaphragm opens. The diaphragm basically creates a hole to allow light to hit the sensor and the Aperture setting affects the size of that hole. Think of it like your pupils, in bright light, the pupils get small to cut the amount of light hitting you retina. In low light, your pupils get bigger to allow in more light. Aperture is the most important setting since it affects the final result the most. Aperture can affect the brightness of a photo too.

Moving from one f-stop to the next can either double or half the amount of light hitting the sensor by increasing or decreasing the size of the opening. Example - if you are at f-8 and move to f-11, you half the light. If you go to f-5.6, you double the light hitting the sensor. Depth of Field is also greatly affected by Aperture settings. The lower the Aperture setting (a bigger opening), the less area that will be in sharp focus. f-2.8 will have a very narrow area in focus while f-16 will have a much deeper area in focus. A very narrow depth of field is often used to have one flower or item in focus and everything else out of focus to really highlight the flower. In a landscape, you want a much deeper area in focus so everything from foreground to background is in focus.

Shutter speed controls how fast the diaphragm opens and closes. Slower speeds allow more light and faster allows less light to hit the sensor. If you are shooting wildlife or sports, you usually want faster shutter speeds so the action is frozen rather than blurred movement. If you are looking to show movement of water in a stream, a slower shutter speed will result in the lacy water look. A slower speed can also be used with landscape in very windy, stormy conditions. It will show the blurred movement of tree leaves, grasses and shrubbery. Best to also have something that is not moving too, such as a building, tree trunks or rock formations. The viewer will then be

able to read the story of the storm conditions in the photo.

Bracket your photos between shutter speeds and Aperture to later pick the best results for the best interpretation of the scene. Bracketing is your insurance policy. Experiment with different settings until you get a feeling for what settings give you the best results.

where there are plenty of free, convenient parking spaces available.

We will take a short walk through the parking lot towards McDonalds and walk along the lakefront towards McKenzie's Ski School, then around to Peninsula Point and the village playground, finally walking down the middle of the Village towards Center Stage.

Our morning will wrap up at the tables of Center Stage with an early lunch (or snack). There are several restaurants in the immediate area, McDonalds, Subway, California Thai Cuisine and Papagayos. I hope you will plan on staying at least an hour after the walk to share your images, socialize, and enjoy a refreshment and/or casual dining experience.

Note: We will be walking for about an hour and a half, so I'd recommend you bring bottled water, sunscreen, wear layered clothing and comfortable shoes! I also encourage you to FULLY charge the camera battery, spare battery and an extra memory card; only bring the photo accessories you will need (it can be uncomfortable carrying heavy equipment).

You are also encouraged to submit pictures from the day to share with other photo walkers. NOTE: more info provided soon. Also, be sure to choose your favorite image to enter the photo contest; more info will be provided soon.


### **Here's What I Think!**

(Note: The article covers different Adobe <u>Lightroom</u> tips. The views expressed in this article are those of the author and do not necessarily reflect the views of Redlands Camera Club.)

On August 22, 2018, Adobe released new updates to Lightroom and Photoshop. *Summary of the Lightroom updates follows:* 

• This release of Lightroom Classic CC rolls out new features and enhancements such as Book module update, customizing pages, uploading Presets and Profiles in bulk, support for new cameras and lenses, and bug fixes.


- Book module enhancements
  - New Blurb Book styles and Paper type
     Two new book types (Blurb Magazine and Blurb Trade Book) and a new paper type (Standard Lay flat) have been introduced in the Book module.
     New Blurb Book styles



New Blurb Book styles - Blurb Magazine and Blurb Trade Book

To access the new Blurb book styles, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to the Book module.
- 2. In the Book Settings panel on the right, click the Book drop-down list.
- 3. In the drop-down list, you can choose from Blurb Photo Book, PDF, JPEG, and the newly introduced Blurb Magazine and Blurb Trade Book.
- New Paper type




New Paper Type - Standard Lay flat

- 1. In the Book Settings panel, select Book as Blurb Photo Book.
- 2. In the Paper Type drop-down list, you can choose from Premium Lustre, Premium Matte, Pro Line Uncoated, Pro Line Pearl Photo, Standard, and the newly introduced Standard Lay flat. When using Standard Lay flat, the minimum page count is 33 due to the binding requirements. The minimum page count for all other paper types is 20.
- Choose where a page number is visible when printed
   You can now select where page numbers are printed on a book, including on only left or right pages, or all pages.

To adjust the location and display of page numbers in a book, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to the Book module.
- 2. In the Page panel on the right, select the Page Numbers check box to enable the following options:
  - a. Location: Choose where you want to print the page number on page Top Corner, Bottom Corner, Top, Side, or Bottom.
  - b. Display: Choose which pages in the book you want to print the page numbers on Left and Right, Left Only, or Right Only.



Choose the position of Page Number to display on the page before publishing.


o Customize cells within a page

You can now add your own custom-sized cells within a page that are not restricted by the standard padding. Add multiple cells on a page, move specific cells to the front or back and drag the cell exactly where you want it. Then, save the look as a custom page to use the look again for another photo book. To add a new cell to a page:

1. Select the page in the preview area.

2. Right-click (Win) / Control-click (Mac) anywhere on the page and choose Add Cell > Photo or a

Photo Description from the context-menu.



Add a new cell to a book page

- To resize or move the cells:
  - 1. Select a cell. A bounding box appears around the cell.
  - 2. To move the selected cell to a specific location on the page, drag the square icon at the center of the bounding box. Alternatively, use Alt (Win)/Option (Mac) + Arrow keys to move the selected cell.
  - 3. To adjust the size of the selected cell, drag one of the corner handles of the bounding box.






(Left) Move the cell by dragging the square icon at the center of the bounding box. (Right) Resize the cell by dragging one of the corner handles of the bounding box.

o To arrange a cell to the front or back:

1. Select a cell.


2. Right-click (Win) / Control-click (Mac) and choose one of the Send to Back or Bring To Front

options from the context-menu.




Bring a cell to the front or send to back

- o To save your page modifications as a custom page:
  - 1. Select a page in the preview area.
  - 2. Right-click (Win) / Control-click (Mac) anywhere on the page and choose Save As Custom Page from the context-menu. You can access the saved custom page in the Page panel on the right.
- Pause and resume the upload of book to Blurb
   In the Activity and Status area at the upper-left corner of the window (next to the Lightroom icon), you can now also pause and resume the upload of the pages to Blurb in the expanded progress bar.
- Upload Presets and Profiles in bulk
   Starting with this release, you can now import multiple presets or profiles in a zip file into Lightroom Classic.
  - 1. Navigate to the Develop module.
  - 2. Do any one of the following:
    - From the menu bar, choose File > Import Develop Profiles and Presets.
    - In the Presets panel, click the plus (+) icon at the upper-right corner and choose Import Presets from the menu.
    - In the Basic panel, click the ( Show Profile Browser icon in the Profile area. In Profile Browser, click the plus (+) icon at the upper-left corner and choose Import Profiles from the menu.

In the import dialog that appears select the zip containing profiles and presets that you want to import.

You can import XMP presets and profiles, DCP profiles, and LCP profiles as part of a zip file. However, Lightroom template presets can't be imported as part of a zip file.

- HEIC image files support on Windows: Beginning with this release, Lightroom Classic CC now supports Apple's HEIC image file formation Windows 10. HEIC stands for High Efficiency Image Format. It uses a more modern compression method than JPEG, so the file sizes are smaller.
- Facebook Changes: Facebook changed their API on August 1, preventing desktop apps from uploading photos. The plug-in was therefore automatically disabled. It's now been re-enabled in read-only mode, so you can access your Facebook album collections but you can't upload direct to Facebook.
- Map Module: You may have spotted an error message in the last few days, saying "Map view will be discontinued on this version of Lightroom" on November 30th, 2018. Don't panic, Lightroom 7.5 and later will carry on working as normal.
