<u>October Field Trip</u> Chinatown

All aboard.

We're off to Chinatown in downtown in Los Angeles by Metrolink on Saturday, October 12th.

We'll depart from the new station in downtown San Bernardino at 9:45AM arriving Union Station at 11:30AM. The return trip is at 4:00PM arriving San

Bernardino at 5:50PM.

There are other trains available both before and after these times if this schedule doesn't suit you. You can also board at the old Santa Fe depot instead of the new station if you prefer. The weekend fare is only \$10 for the day round trip. Tickets are sold from a vending machine. Allow yourself plenty of time to park, purchase your ticket and walk to the boarding platform where you'll meet up with the group.

Chinatown is an exciting destination for photographers. Lots of local color, unusual patterns, oriental architecture, pagodas, sidewalk vendors, bazaar, tourists and, of course, Chinese restaurants. Even the train station has an oriental look.

The new Metrolink station is located at 174 South E Street in San Bernardino (between Rialto Avenue and Mill Street). The station has to be approached from the southbound lane of E Street because the Express bus lane blocks northbound traffic from making a left turn at that location.

The parking area is on the south side of the railroad tracks. The easiest route, if coming to San Bernardino on I-215, is to take the 2^{nd} Street exit, go east to E Street, turn right and follow E Street south to the Metrolink parking lot on the right.

Monthly field trips are free to Redlands Camera Club members but advance registration is required. There will be no carpool provided for this field trip as we will meet at the Metrolink train station.


Member Recognitions

Here's What I Think - John Williams

will try to assist you. Monitor Calibration:

- Why Calibrate: If you haven't calibrated your monitor, *you cannot trust the color, contrast or brightness* you are seeing. If you are editing your images on a non-calibrated monitor, you are wasting your time. They may look great to you on your monitor, but there is very little chance that they will look beautiful in print. The process of calibration is as important as anything else you do in your photo workflow. Your monitor can tell you the truth, or it is telling you a lie and if you are editing your images (adding warmth, contrast, brightness) based on an inaccurate representation of your photo, you are guessing at best!
- Color Calibration Tools: X-rite and Datacolor are makers of several different monitor calibration devices. Two devices are reasonably priced (X-rite Color Munki-\$120 and Datacolor SpyderX Pro-\$170). Redland Camera Club can provide you with the Color Munki calibration system to calibrate your monitor, free of charge if you are a member in good standing.

• Know calibration nomenclature:

- White Point: You can choose several settings for color temperature but in most cases you will want to select D65 or D55. D65 represent 6500 Kelvins which is a normal daylight experience. If you select D50, you are warming up the viewing experience.
- Luminance: The setting controls how bright the image will be on your monitor. If you are going to
 print your photo and since paper reflects off the sheet of paper, a value of 100 cd/m² is your best
 option.
- **Gamma:** Gamma is basically contrast and the best option is generally a value of **2.20**.

3-2-1 Computer Backup Strategy:

- A *3-2-1 backup strategy* means having at least three total copies of your data, two of which are local but on different mediums (an external hard drive in addition to your computer's local drive), and one copy with a cloud backup provider (such as Backblaze).
- You need to diversify where copies of your data live to decrease the likelihood of losing your data due to fire or thief. You should consider placing an external backup hard drive off site (your office or another home) that is updated frequently.
- It's important to consider how easy it is to get your data back from your backup services. Generally, the sync and share services only allow customers to download files over the internet. If you are trying to download more than a couple gigabytes of data, the process can take time and can be fraught with errors. Therefore, make sure that the Cloud Sync service you choose can provide you with an USB hard drive of all you backup data.


• Difference Between Cloud Sync and Backup Services:

- Backup: Users have one folder on their computer that is designated for Dropbox, Google Drive, OneDrive, or another syncing/sharing service. Normally users save or place data into a single folder that they want to appear on other devices. Files in the backup folder are available across devices; however, files outside of that folder (on the computer's desktop) are not synced or stored by the syncing and sharing services. Generally, the sync and share services only allow customers to download files over the internet.
- **Cloud Sync:** Cloud based services (Backblaze, Carbonite, etc.) automatically back up all user data with little or no setup, and there is no need for the dragging-and-dropping of files.


PHOTOSHOP TIPS

Add Color to your Highlights:

- First add a Solid Color Adjustment layer. Then pick a color for your highlights such as bright orange. Double-click the layer Thumbnail to launch the Color Picker (see left figure below). Move the **Color Slider** to set your color (orange) and move the **Circular Marker** to a bright orange in the Color Field.
- Double-click the right side of the Layer to launch the **Layer Style dialog** or click the *fx* icon at the bottom of the Layers Panel. In the popup menu select Blending Options. In the Layer Style dialog (see right figure below), drag the dark slider to the right until you satisfied with the areas that are colored (highlight area)s. Smooth out the blending by separating the Black slider (hold down the **Alt key** and click on the Black slider triangle). Move the right half triangle to the right and possibly moving the left split triangle to the left depending on your photo.



- At this point your photo will not look correct because there will be too much added color (in this case orange). Change the layer blend mode from Normal to Soft Light. This will add a mild color to the highlights.
- To further control the color area, relaunch the Layer Style dialog and move (right and left) each split Dark triangle to taste.
- You can readjust the color by double-clicking the layer Thumbnail to launch the *Color Picker*. Then move the **Color Slider** up/down to taste.
- Do a stamped visible layer (Ctrl+Shift+Alt+E) and change the layer to a Smart Object (Layer>Smart Objects>Convert to Smart Object). Then launch Camera Raw Filter (Filter>Camera Raw Filter) and move all the



sliders including the White Balance sliders to taste. Since this layer is a Smart Object, you can relaunch the Camera Raw Filter to readjust your photo to taste.



LIGHTROOM TIPS Roll Back to an Earlier Lightroom Classic Release:

- Due to the many variations of computer hardware and operating systems, sometimes you will have an issue that is serious and you can roll back to a previous release.
- To roll back to a previous release, do the following:

1. Open the Creative Cloud App on your desktop.

- 2.Click the arrow next to Lightroom Classic's Open button and select **Manage>Other Versions** (left figure below).
- 3.Click **Install** next to the first listed version (see the right figure below). This is the version prior to the current version.
- 4.**IMPORTANT:** Remember not to click the Update button in the CC app until an updated version is released, otherwise you'll be updated to the latest version again.
