




We are very pleased to announce that Bruce Herwig will be presenting his "Milky Way Magic" via the internet. He will be using the "Zoom" video conferencing app.



FBI SEES RISE IN FRAUD SCHEMES RELATED TO THE CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) PANDEMIC

Scammers are leveraging the COVID-19 pandemic to steal your money, your personal information, or both. Don't let them. Protect yourself and do your research before clicking on links purporting to provide information on the virus; donating to a charity online or through social media; contributing to a crowdfunding campaign; purchasing products online; or giving up your personal information in order to receive money or other benefits. The FBI advises you to be on the lookout for the following:

Fake CDC Emails.

Watch out for emails claiming to be from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) or other organizations claiming to offer information on the virus. Do not click links or open attachments you do not recognize. Fraudsters can use links in emails to deliver malware to your computer to steal personal information or to lock your computer and demand payment. Be wary of websites and apps claiming to track COVID-19 cases worldwide. Criminals are using malicious websites to infect and lock devices until payment is received.

Phishing Emails.

Look out for phishing emails asking you to verify your personal information in order to receive an economic stimulus check from the government. While talk of economic stimulus checks has been in the news cycle, government agencies are *not* sending unsolicited emails seeking your private information in order to send you money. Phishing emails may also claim to be related to:

- Charitable contributions
- General financial relief
- Airline carrier refunds
- Fake cures and vaccines
- Fake testing kits

Counterfeit Treatments or Equipment.

Be cautious of anyone selling products that claim to prevent, treat, diagnose, or cure COVID-19. Be alert to counterfeit products such as sanitizing products and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), including N95 respirator masks, goggles, full face shields, protective gowns, and gloves. More information on unapproved or counterfeit PPE can be found at www.cdc.gov/niosh. You can also find information on the U.S. Food and Drug Administration website, www.epa.gov, and the Environmental Protection Agency website, www.epa.gov. Report counterfeit products at www.ic3.gov and to the National Intellectual Property Rights Coordination Center at iprotection center iprotection ce

If you are looking for accurate and up-to-date information on COVID-19, the CDC has posted extensive guidance and information that is updated frequently. The best sources for authoritative information on COVID-19 are www.cdc.gov and www.coronavirus.gov. You may also consult your primary care physician for guidance.

The FBI is reminding you to always use good cyber hygiene and security measures. By remembering the following tips, you can protect yourself and help stop criminal activity:

- Do not open attachments or click links within emails from senders you don't recognize.
- Do not provide your username, password, date of birth, social security number, financial data, or other personal information in response to an email or robocall.
- Always verify the web address of legitimate websites and manually type them into your browser.
- Check for misspellings or wrong domains within a link (for example, an address that should end in a ".gov" ends in .com" instead).



Spring 2020 Competition Best of Show and 1st Place Ribbons









March Competition results \$4C





Here's What I Think!

This article covers different Adobe Photoshop/Lightroom tips and techniques. The views expressed in this article are those of the author and do not necessarily reflect the views of Redlands Camera Club. By John Williams

PHOTOSHOP TIPS

What's new in the February 2020 release of Photoshop on desktop (version 21.1):

• Enhanced Content-Aware Fill: Make a selection of an area you want to replace (use any selection tool) and choose Edit>Content-Aware Fill to launch the Content-Aware Fill Workspace. You can now iteratively fill multiple areas of an image without having to leave the Content-Aware Fill workspace window. After you get the desired fill result for a selection in your image, click the Apply button in the lower-right corner to commit fill changes and keep the workspace window open. After applying the fill, use Lasso Tool or Polygonal Lasso Tool within the Content-Aware Fill workspace to make another selection to fill.

Also, you can now sample source pixels from all visible layers in the document by selecting the new **Sample All Layers** option. The Sampling Area Options appear in the Content-Aware Fill.

• Improved Lens Blur quality: The new Lens Blur algorithm now uses your computer's graphics card (GPU) to generate blurrier edges on objects that are in front of the


focal plane, a more realistic bokeh look, correct color handling for CMYK and LAB color modes, and more colorful specular highlights in your photos.

To enable graphics processor in Photoshop, choose **Edit>Preferences>Performance**, and check the Use Graphics Processor box in the Preferences dialog.

To add a Lens Blur to your photo, choose Filter>Blur>Lens Blur.

Photoshop turns 30!

- On February 19, 1990, Photoshop turned 30-years of age.
- Terry White is the Principal Worldwide Design & Photography Evangelist for Adobe. He has been with Adobe for over 20 years and has extensive knowledge of



Adobe's Creative Professional product line. His Top 30 favorite Photoshop Features of all time that he can't live without are:

- 1. **Spot Healing Tool:** This tool lets you correct imperfections, causing them to disappear into the surrounding image. The tool matches the texture, lighting, transparency, and shading of the sampled pixels to the pixels being healed.
- 2. **Patch Tool:** This tool is normally used to repair larger areas, such as a big scratch or a large area of skin.
- 3. **Select Subject:** Select Subject is now powered by Adobe Sensei AI. This feature can make quick work of selecting what Photoshop thinks the subject is in your photo.
- 4. **Select and Mask**: This feature allows you to quickly and easily cutout a subject and place it on a different background.
- 5. **Quick Select Tool**: The Quick Selection Tool works more like a brush, allowing you to select areas simply by "painting" over them. The tool automatically selects similar tones and stops when it finds image edges.

Resolution problems when printing:

• Low-resolution:

- The biggest problem sending files to a printer or Photo Lab is too little resolution. Every form of print technology requires a minimum of pixels to produce fully-detailed and sharp images.
- When you resize your image, make sure you assign an appropriate PPI (pixel-per-inch) for the printer being used. Normally the print industry requires 300-PPI resolution.

• Upping the size of an image:

- Generally you never want to increase your image size significantly since you can't create detail. Pixels are not rubber, and you cannot stretch them to a larger size without sacrificing the sharpness of the image. Every time you enlarge an image, you distort the pixels. So if you want to print sharp images, don't enlarge them.
- Your digital camera most likely provides you with ample original pixels to print most projects, try to stay within that original ratio.
- Normally upsizing an image *slightly* will not result in noticeable softness.


LIGHTROOM CLASSIC TIPS

How do I roll back to an earlier Lightroom Classic release?


• Before a new release of Lightroom, extensive testing is done. However, due to the many variations of computer hardware and operating systems, sometimes an issue is

found that's serious enough that you'd want to roll back to a previous release. Here's how you do it step-by-step:

- 1. Open the Creative Cloud App from the System/Desktop Tray (Windows) / Menu Bar (Mac).
- 2. Click the three "periods, ..." next to Lightroom Classic's Open button and select Other versions from the popup menu.




3. Click **Install** next to the first listed version. This is the version prior to the current version. For example, if the current version is 9.2, the previous version is 9.1. Bear in mind that if you try to go back to a prior version and your current one had to upgrade the catalog to work, the updated catalog won't work with the earlier version.



Using the White Balance Selector Tool to set your White Balance:

• This is one of the most efficient methods to adjust white balance in an image. Select


the "White Balance Selector" tool in the White Balance panel (shortcut, press "W" key). Move your cursor over the image (Preview area) to an area that is neutral gray color. If there are no neutral gray points in your Preview area, then select an area that the RGB percentage values are nearly identical (see figure to right) For a realistic White Balance, try to find and area where the RGB percentage values are close to 75.0. %



- If you click the **Show Loupe** checkbox then you'll see a *5 by 5 pixel grid* beside the mouse cursor. The center point in the grid is the pixel that you are currently targeting. The number of pixel grids can be increased or decreased using the **Scale** slider option. If you check the **Auto Dismiss** box, the eyedropper will automatically return to the Develop module when you set a White Balance (clicking on a pixel).
- Open the **Navigator Panel** (left panels) and as you scan across your image you will see a preview of the White Balance.
- After making a White Balance selection with the White Balance Selector tool, you can refine your White Balance by moving the WB Temperature and Tint sliders.

Three things that are underutilized/ignored:

1. **Tone Curve Panel** — **Regions Curve:** You will be able to affect the tones better than the global sliders in the Develop module. To increase contrast in the highlights area (sky), try moving the Highlights slider to the left (see figure below).



- 2. Calibration —Blue Saturation Slider: Moving the Blue saturation slider (see figure above) to the right will normally give a richer blue/yellow color in landscape photos and make your photo pop.
- 3. Clipping Indicators: If you depress the J key, you may see red and blue splotches (clipping) in your Image Preview area. Clipping indicates a lack of digital information in a portion of your image, meaning those areas that show up with the red or blue overlay have no visual detail. When displayed either on the web or in print, those areas will appear pure white or pure black. When you print a highlighted clipped photo, the clipped areas will not receive any ink (those areas will be the color of the paper). When shadow areas are clipped (blue overlay), those areas will be totally black when printed. To remove clipped areas in your photo, move the White (left) and Black (right) sliders in the Develop Module. The Exposure, Shadow, and Highlight sliders can also remove Clipping. It's important to remove all highlight clipping and some shadow clipping.
