

Competition for August 2020

The next competition will be a little different.

First of all it will be a Fall competition, something we haven't had in a long time, if ever. It will be held the second Monday in September,

September 21, 2020. That's different from our competitions usually held on the first Monday, but we decided not to have it on Labor Day.

Second will be our submission dates. Usually we take submissions from the first to the third Mondays of the month prior to the competition, but this time we are allowing an extra week. Submissions will be accepted on the website from the morning of August 3 until 11 PM, August 24.

The usual \$10 entry fee for one or two images will apply and the competition will be open to all members in good standing. (Dues paid for 2020-21, due April 1, 2020) Each member may submit one or two images. Images must be JPG, and are limited to 3.5 MB, 4,000 pixels on the long side, sRGB color space and 200ppi. Categories for entry are listed on the web site.

Category X will be "HDR." HDR a few years ago meant an oversaturated image with a very specific look; some liked it, others did not. What we are looking for in this competition is a tonally balanced color or monochrome image that shows that the photographer has successfully dealt with the challenges of bringing out detail in shadows and highlights in harmony with the rest of the image.

You may enter as an Apprentice, Intermediate, or Advanced photographer. (You decide.) We are looking forward to seeing the very best from our members. Good Luck!






Member Recognitions

Photographer's Etiquette

We have talked about etiquette by photographers when out in nature and around wildlife but not about when photographing public events. I was recently photographing protests events in Redlands for the police department to document any possible issues that might come up, whether from within the protest group or from without. At one of the events downtown at Ed Hale's Park at 6th and State Street, there were quite a few different speakers over more than an hour. Speakers got up on the stage in front of the crowd which covered the entire park and roadway. I noticed a number of different people who had cameras who were moving in and out of the stage area, shooting photos of the speakers and crowd from different angles. They got their shot

then moved back out of the way of other photographers and the audience.

I did notice one photographer though that just stayed up on the stage, within about 8-10 feet of each of the many speakers for the entire time. He had one camera with a telephoto lens; another camera with a wide angle lens and a camera bag all hanging over his shoulders while wearing a bright blue and white plaid shirt and big floppy hat. He was impossible to not see.

Much of the time, he was not even shooting photos, just standing there. It made it impossible for other photographers who were photographing the event and speakers, not to have Mr. Camera Guy in their photos.

He was just standing there and doing nothing most of the time. There were banners and posters displayed on the wall behind the speakers on the stage that people would have wanted to include in their overall photos of the event but Mr. Camera Guy definitely stood out as not belonging in that scene.

If you are photographing some event, try not to be a distracting participant, whether others are photographing it or not. Quickly get your shots then move out of the way so you are not blocking the view from the audience or not in the photo of other photographers. If speakers or things change, move in again, get your shot then back out of the way. Be considerate of others who may want to also capture photos of an event.





54C End of Year Competition Results are Announced

At the end of each competition year, all images that have been earned Awards or Honorable Mentions throughout the year are entered into a final competition to award Gold, Silver, Bronze and Best of Show in each category. Rankings or Standing in each skill level and category are also determined. The results have been announced and members of the

Redlands Camera Club did very well.

S4C has 11 image categories and, except for Interclub, 4 skill level categories in each section. Those members entering a category for the first competition year are entered at the E skill level. Levels then proceed to A, AA, and AAA determined by one's performance in past competition years. As a photographer moves through the more advanced levels, a higher image score is needed to earn an HM or an Award.

Standings in each Skill Level are determined by totaling the scores of a photographer's 12 highest scoring images entered into competition that year and ranking those scores against all members who entered images in the same category at that level.

Two members of RCC earned medals this year as High Point winners in the category of Nature Wildlife. Lori Krum earned a Gold medal in Skill level A and Christine Pence earned a Bronze medal in Skill Level E.

Awards and Honorable Mentions were earned by the following RCC members.

Individual Color-HM for Stan Fry (E) for "Hands of a Master"

Pictorial Creative-HM Deb Seibly (E) for "San Clemente in Pastel"

Pictorial Monochrome-Silver Medal for Christine Pence for "Nifty Fifty Diner"

Nature General-Silver Medal for **Stan Fry** (E) for "The Pollinator"; HM for **Stan Fry** for "Beautiful" and another HM for **Stan** for "You Never go Hungry"

Nature Wildlife-Bronze Medal for Lori Krum (A) for "Feeding Time" and HM for Lori Krum for "Snownuzzling"; HM for Christine Pence(E) for "Jackass Penguin Parenting"


Photo Travel-Silver Medal for Christine Pence (A) for "Port Townsend Graffiti"; HM for Deb Seibly (AA) for "City Palace City Palace".

Photojournalism General-HM for Stan Fry (E) for "Chris Fast Band"

Photojournalism –Human Interest-Silver Medal for **Deb Seibly** (A) for "Half an Hour Old" and HM for **Deb Seibly** for "Cinderella Wanna Be".

Pete Bechtol is also the winner of three S4C end of year awards. Peter won the following: Individual Color-HM (A) for "Mormon Barn" and HM for "Cheetah Girl" Photojournalism – General –an HM (AAA) for "Rodeo Buck Off".

Congratulations everyone. It was an impressive catalogue with competition among 19 different clubs throughout Southern California. The winning images can be seen below.





































Here's What I Think!

PHOTOSHOP TIPS

Remove Dark Circles/Bags under a person's Eyes (two methods):

1. Patch Tool:

- This method is the quickest way but may not give you satisfactory results for every photograph.
- Duplicate the layer (background layer) by depressing the Ctrl+J keys.
- Select the *Patch Tool* and make a selection of the dark area under the eye (see figure to the right). Then move downward under the eye to select a replacement area.
- To make the area look more natural, decrease the layer **Opacity**.

2. Clone Stamp Tool:

- Duplicate the layer (background layer) by depressing the Ctrl+J keys.
- Select the *Clone Stamp Tool* and in the Options bar select **Lighten** for the Blend Mode, reduce Flow to 10% and use a soft brush (Hardness set to 0).

• Resize the brush using the bracket keys ([,]).



- Sample an area below the eye (hold down the Alt key) that is lighter than the dark area directly below the eye.
- Paint over the dark area. Note the *Flow* is set at 10% so you will need to paint several times to build up the effect.
- To make the area look more natural, reduce the layer **Opacity**.

LIGHTROOM TIPS

Change how much (or how little) info you see in your thumbnails quickly:

- Depress the letter **g** to open the Grid view in the Library Module regardless what module you're working in.
- To change the size of the thumbnails depress the plus (+) or minus (-) keys or move the Thumbnail slider (located at the right side of the toolstrip). If the Toolstrip isn't showing, depress the letter T.


• To change the Thumbnail info/display, repeatedly depress the letter J:

Compact cell display



- 1. The filename of the photo.
- 2. The white flag indicates this photo has been flagged as a pick.
- 3. The big number 1 shows this image is the first in the sequence in the currently selected folders or Collections.
- 4. The light grey border means this photo is selected.
- 5. The RED border shows that the red color label has been applied to this image. This photo is selected, so Lightroom displays a thin border. If the image is not selected, Lightroom applies the color label to the entire border.
- 6. There are two black icons at the bottom right of the photo (you may see different icons depending on what you have done to the image). The icon on the left indicates that the photo has GPS coordinates. The icon on the right tells you that the photo has Develop adjustments. Tip: If you hover your mouse over an icon and keep it still, Lightroom will display a label telling you what the icon means. It appears after about two seconds.
- 7. The grey circle in the top right indicates that the photo has been added to at least one Collection.

 Tip: To see what Collections the photo has been added to right-click on the thumbnail and in the popup menus select the 'Go to Collection' option.
- 8. Rotate image left or right.
- **Expanded cell display:** The cells are larger than the Compact cells, and contain a little more information.




- 1. The filename of the photo, with the file type (in this case, TIF).
- 2. These figures show the dimensions of the photo in pixels.
- 3. Rating (in this case three stars).
- 4. The black flag indicates that this photo has been flagged as a reject.
- 5. Color rating (in this case green).
- 6. Capture Mega Pixels and date/time.
- The third display removes all information. This display is all about the image.

Keywording:

- As the number of photos in your catalog grows, finding a photo is essential.
 One of the best ways to do this is by assigning keywords to your photo(s).
 Keyword tags are text metadata used to describe the content of the photo.
 Keywords can be stored in the metadata of the files and understood by a wide range of software.
- There are no hard and fast rules for keywording. The main rule is simple—use keywords that will help you find your photos. Recommended keyword principles area:
 - 1. Who is in the photo (people).
 - 2. What is in the photo (subjects or objects)
 - 3. Where the photo was taken (names of locations)
 - 4. Why the photo was taken (what's happening)
 - 5. When the photo was taken (sunrise/sunset, season, event)
 - 6. How the photo was taken (HDR, focus stacked, panoramic, etc.)
- Keywords in Lightroom Classic / Lightroom (Cloud): While you can add keywords to both versions of Lightroom, be aware that they don't sync keywords. Therefore adding keywords in Lightroom mobile won't populate them in the Lightroom Classic. If you migrate from Lightroom Classic to Lightroom (Cloud) using the migration tool, then keywords are migrated in a flat (non-hierarchical) form to the cloud.

- To find a photo with a specific keyword: In the Library Module, do one of the two methods below:
 - 1. Open the Keyword List Panel: Scroll down the keyword list until you find the keyword you want. Click on or hover your cursor over the name of the keyword. In the example below, I hovered over the Keyword titled Moon. To the right of the keyword name will be a number indicating the total photos that are assigned this keyword and a White arrow point to the right (see red arrow in figure below). When you click on the White Arrow, all photos with this keyword will be displayed in the Image Preview area (Grid view).



In the Figure above, a hierarchy of keywords is used meaning that keywords are nested inside other keywords.

- 2. Open the Library Filter Bar (depress the Backslash key [\]):
 - In the Library module, select a source Folder, Collection or All Photos in your Catalog (.
 - Select Text along the top of the Filter bar, then depress the doublearrow in the Text field and from the popup menu and select Keywords (see red arrow in Figure below). Then


