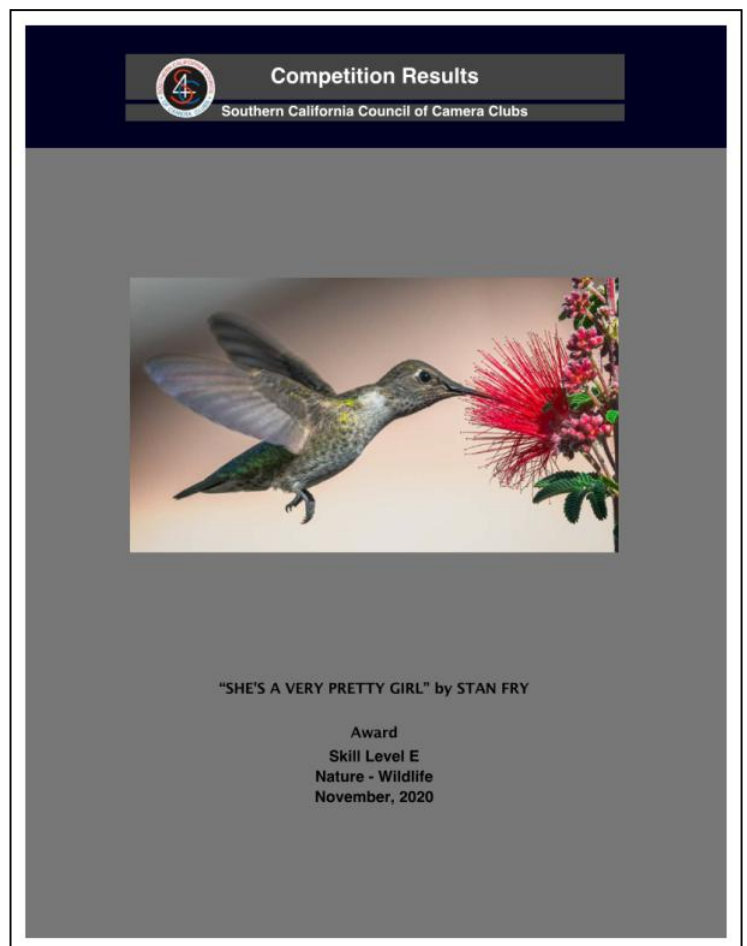
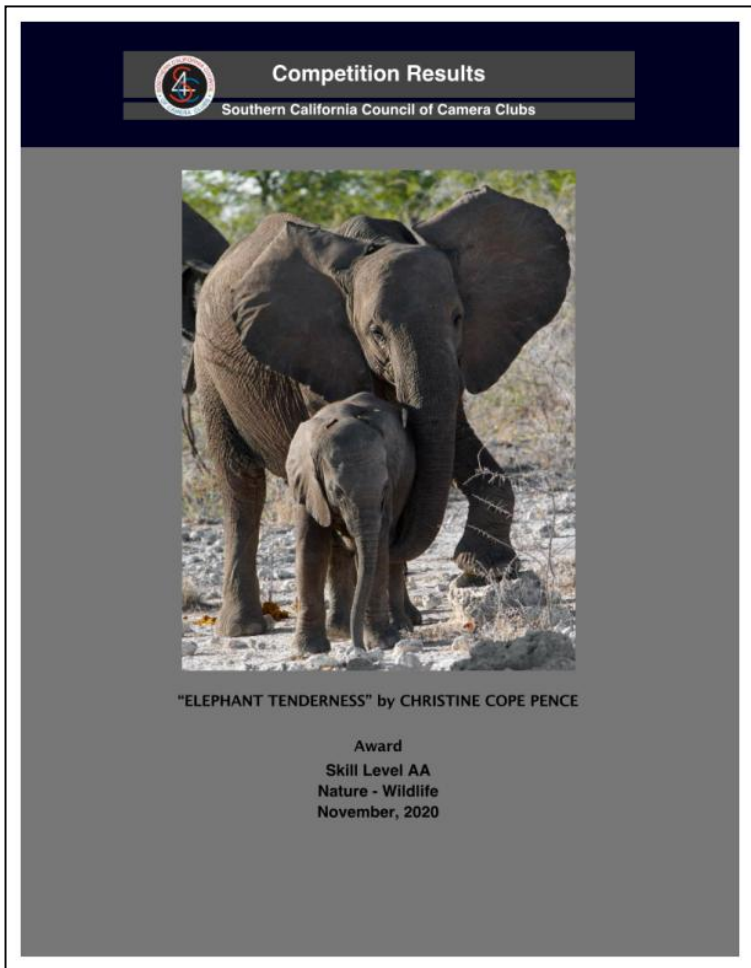


S4C Report for November and December Competitions

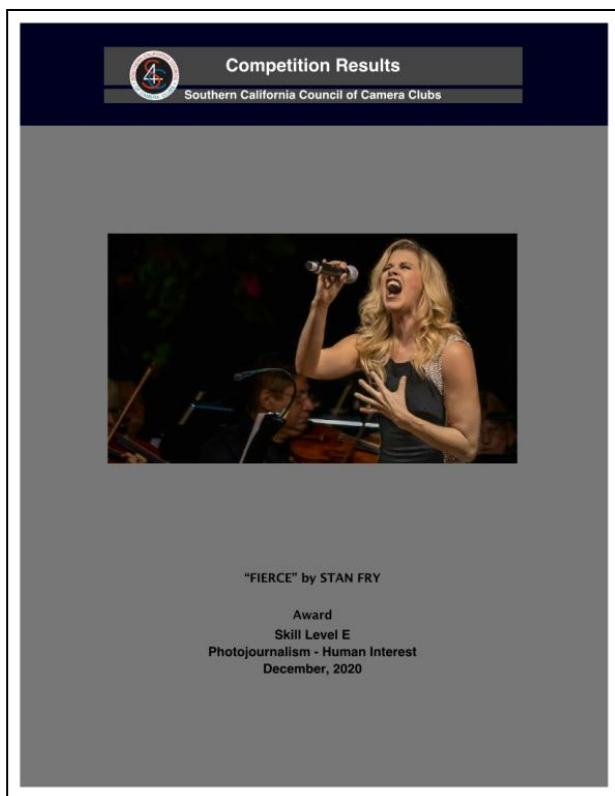


In December, Awards and Honorable Mentions were earned by John White, Ken Randall and Stan Frye.

Here are some processing techniques

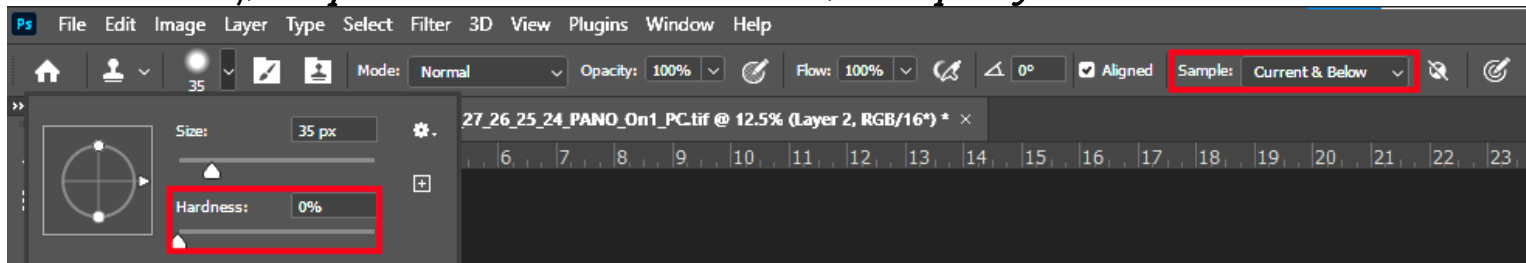


PHOTOSHOP TIPS

• Fix blown out sky areas:

- If you move the exposure slider (Camera Raw) all the way to the left, and you notice blown out areas do not disappear, then fix those areas doing the following:

1. Add a **Create a new layer** icon button and label it *Cloned Clouds*.
2. Select the **Clone Stamp** tool. In the Options bar make sure the *Brush Hardness* is set to **0** (soft brush), *Brush Size* is set **relatively large** (size of area you are trying to fix), *Sample* is set to **Current and Below**, and *Opacity & Flow* set to **100%**.



3. Then clone stamp a nearby sky area that has pixel information.

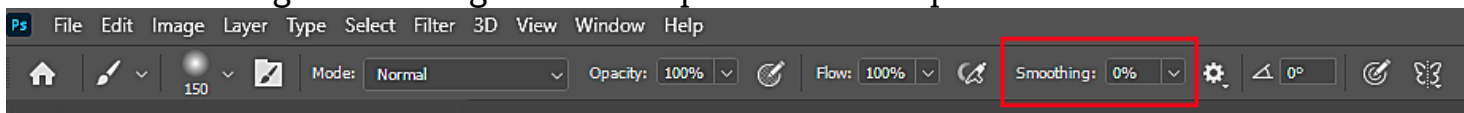
• Close all tabs at once in photoshop:

- Hold the **Shift** key down and click one of the document **X**'s.
- To close all open images regardless of whether you're viewing them as tabs or floating windows, go to **File>Close All**. If asked if you want to save changes, Photoshop will give three options save them all (or not) without further prompts. Be sure to check the **Apply to All** box.



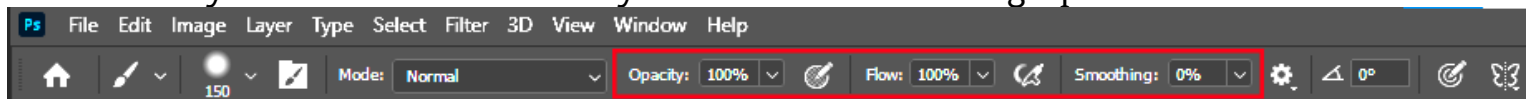
• TURN OFF SMOOTHING FOR BETTER BRUSH PERFORMANCE

- If you ever find the Brush Tool lagging, it's probable do the Smoothing option set too high.
- In the Brush Tool options bar, check the Smoothing setting which is set to 10% by default. Change the setting to **0%** to experience a full speed brush.



• **Opacity vs. Flow:** The Brush Tool is one of the most commonly used Tools in Photoshop. Knowing the Difference between Flow and Opacity while using the Brush Tool will make your life much easier when editing.

- When you select the **Brush Tool** you will see the following Options bar:



- **Smoothing:** This setting is used for illustrative purposes when you try to smooth out curves. For Photography purposes when doing retouching, it is best to reduce Smoothing to **0%**.
- **Flow:** This determines how quickly you get to 100% when painting over the same area. Flow sets the speed that the color is applied. Think of Flow like dialing the amount of water coming out of a faucet. 100 per cent gives you all of the color in one shot, while lower Flow allows for lighter lines that will build up to the Opacity ceiling.

As you paint over an area, while holding down the mouse button, the amount of color builds up based on the flow rate, up to the opacity setting. For example, if you set the opacity to 33% and the flow to 33%, each time you move over an area, its color moves 33% toward the brush color. The total will not exceed 33% opacity unless you release the mouse button and stroke over the painted area again.

Shortcut to set Flow: Hold down the **Shift** key and then type a number.

WARNING: Be careful when adjusting the Flow. If you paint, then take your finger off your mouse and begin painting again, you will end up with areas that have 'more paint' on them than others. If you alter the value in the Opacity box, the Flow will always match the value of it, no matter how many times you paint over your image.

- **Opacity:** Opacity controls the opaqueness of the paint (the transparency). This setting sets a hard limit. As you paint over an area, the opacity does not exceed the set level no matter how many times you move the mouse pointer over the area, until you release the mouse button. If you stroke over the area again, you apply additional color, equivalent to the set opacity. Opacity of 100 percent is opaque.

Shortcut to set Opacity: Press a single number key to set a tool's opacity in multiples of 10% (pressing 1 sets it to 10%; pressing 0 sets it to 100%). Press two number keys quickly to set a specific opacity (e.g., 45%).

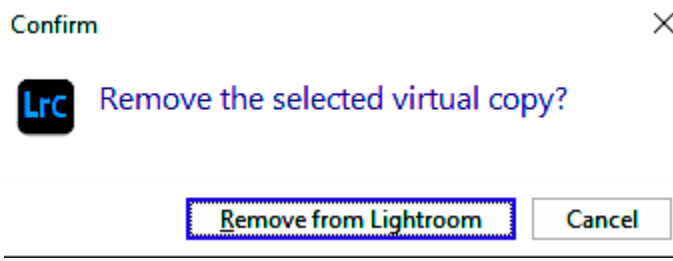
LIGHTROOM TIPS

- **Advantage of Using Virtual Copies in Lightroom:**

- Virtual Copies take up very little file size and you try out different looks and processing versions. These virtual copies look and act the same as your original photo.
- You create a virtual copy by Right-clicking on the original photo and then choosing **Create Virtual Copy** from the pop-up menu or using the keyboard shortcut (MAC: apostrophe; PC: Ctrl-').
- When you create a virtual copy, you'll know which version is the copy because the virtual copies have a curled page icon in the lower-left corner of the image thumbnail (circled in red below) in both the Grid view and in the Filmstrip.

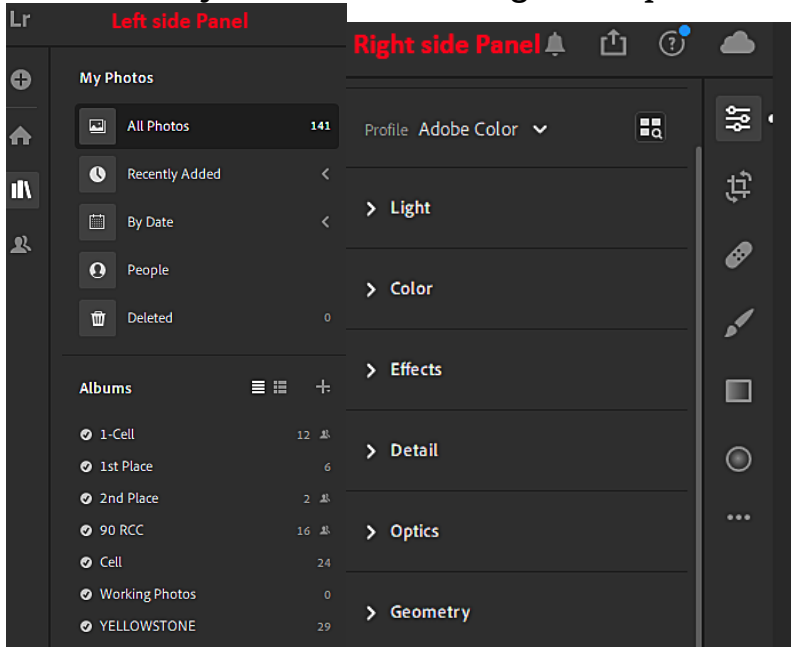


- You can experiment with multiple virtual copies of your original photo, at no risk to your original photo or your hard drive space. Click on your first virtual copy, then press Command-' (PC: Ctrl-') to make another virtual copy.
- Compare versions: If you want to compare all your experimental versions side by side, go back to the Grid view, select your original photo and all the virtual copies, then press the letter N on your keyboard to enter the Survey view.
- Delete Virtual Copies: To delete a virtual copy, click on it and press the Delete key [or for the PC: Backspace key, and then click Remove from Lightroom in the Confirm dialog that appears.

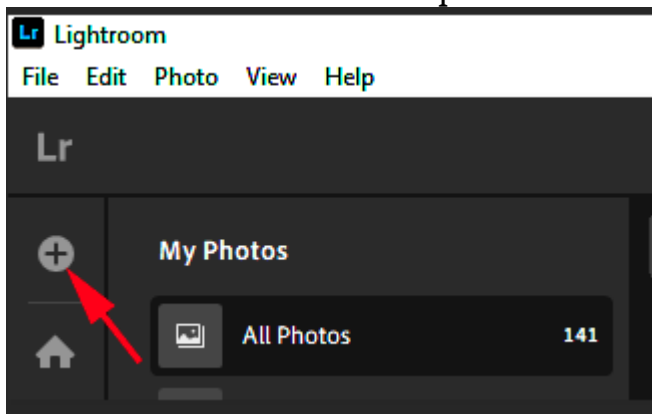


• **Major Differences between Lightroom Classic and Lightroom (cloud version):**

1. **Lightroom Classic** has seven modules (Library, Develop, Map, etc.) whereas **Lightroom** does not use modules. The left side of Lightroom UI is similar to the Library module and the right side panel is used to edit.



2. The keyboard shortcuts are different. For example, when you depress the **P key** in LR Classic, the image is marked as a Pick. In Lightroom the **P key** opens and closes the left Panel.
3. In LR Classic, your images are in Folders. If you want to group images together, you place them in Collections. In Lightroom, your images are placed in the Cloud. You can group them together in an Album and to group multiple Albums together, you do that in Folders.
4. All images are placed in the Cloud in Lightroom; however, to placed images in the Cloud in LR Classic, you must place the images first to a designated Collection and designate that Collection to sync with the Cloud.
5. In LR Classic you Import your photos into the Lightroom catalog and to a specific location on a drive using the Import button. Where as in Lightroom, you depress the plus (+) button to the left of My Photo (see figure below) and navigate to the location of your photo(s) in File Explorer. The photos you select will be uploaded to Adobe Cloud and the photos will not be moved.



6. Lightroom Edit Panel uses different terminology. For example, the Color panel in Lightroom contains the HSL (Hue, Saturation, Luminance) sliders.
7. There are no Virtual Copies in Lightroom. If you want to do two or more processes to the same photo, then you will need to do it to a copy. Multiple instances of the same image are called **Versions**.
8. The Print Module and its feature are missing from Lightroom.
