Including People in your Photos


In many situations with landscape or travel photos, we are looking at not having people in our photos but there are many times when a person or people in the photo will add to the photo or make more of a personal contact with the viewer.

In a landscape, including a person can help give a reference scale to how big the trees, rock formations, cliffs or area is. The trick is making sure they are easily seen and look natural. The subject wearing bright colored clothing or silhouetted against a brighter area, helps.

I once shot a mountain when two hikers stopped at a viewpoint. The grey mountainside behind them made them impossible to even see, so I quickly moved my position by about 50 yards to where they were now silhouetted in front of a white patch of snow on the mountainside behind them. Having someone on a trail or viewing a scene from behind, makes the viewer feel like that could be them right there.

In travel photo scenes, people in the scene can give the scene more life, showing the normal activity to that spot rather than deserted. Another nice effect is to shoot the scene in low light or with a neutral density filter to make the scene much darker with a slower shutter speed. Still expose for the buildings, fountains or street scene to be well exposed. The movement of people in the scene will now be blurred movement or, can completely eliminate most people moving thru the scene. People standing still will show up in the photo. You will need a tripod to accomplish this.

Do keep in mind that any photos that you are going to sell or enter into many competitions, you will need a signed Model Release form for anyone that is identifiable in the photo. That is again why, a view from the back will often be better. You can also be the person in the scene yourself by using your 10 second timer, giving you time to get into a nearby position, or use a remote shutter release for further positioning. Just make sure your tripod and camera are in a solid position or someone else securing it.




PHOTOSHOP TIPS

Gradient Adjustment Layer:

Photoshop 2020 has changed the Gradient Adjustment. The big difference is the Preset Gradients are located under Folders by color (see figure below). If you want to see the gradients like the old Gradient Editor, then click on the first color, hold down the Shift key, and click on the last color gradient. Then move to the very top of the popup dialog and release your mouse. This will allow you to build a gradient palette.




- Change the Defaults settings of the Gradient Editor:
 - o To launch the Gradients window go to **Window>Gradients** (see figure below).
 - Next click on the menu icon (four horizontal white line icon red arrow in figure below) located in the top right of window.
 - o Recommend you select **Small Thumbnail** to see more gradients in the palette, **Show Resents** (gradients will be shown along top) and the **type of Gradient** you want (Linear Gradient is most cases).



Get back the old Save As command:

• Go to **Preferences>File Handling tab**. This will open the dialog shown in the figure below



• Check Enable legacy "Save AS" and do not append "copy" to filename when saving a copy.

Get Photoshop to guess at what font was used in any scanned image that contains text.

- Open the image in Photoshop and select the Rectangular Marquee Tool. Use this tool to select the area of an image that contains text you want to match.
- From the toolbar, choose **Type>Match Font**. A rectangle will be placed on your screen. Resize the rectangle to cover three lines of text. After you place the Match Font Selection Box closely around the text, Photoshop displays automatically list fonts similar to the font in the image, including fonts from Type kit.


Open the image in Photoshop. If the type is a little distorted then you may want to adjust it before trying to match the font. Simply duplicate the background layer in the layers panel then use the Edit > Transform > Distort function to adjust the typography and any distortion that has occurred when taking the photo. You may wish to drag guides on to the document to help with this. You may also wish to clean up the background surrounding the type at this point.

Once you're happy with the look of the type, simply use the rectangular marquee tool to draw a box around the type that you want to match. This will work best if you keep the selection to one word or line of type, keep the selection close to the edges of where the type begins and ensure that the selection area is as clear from dust and scratches as possible.

Choose from the matched fonts already installed on your machine, or download from Type kit by clicking the cloud icon.

To see the Type set matches, make sure that you have an internet connection and that you're signed into Adobe Creative Cloud. You'll also need to make sure that "Add fonts from Type kit" is elected from the Fonts tab found within the assets tab in the Adobe Creative Cloud desktop app.


Now simply choose one of the suggested fonts, draw a text box and start typing.



LIGHTROOM TIPS

Scott Kelby's seven Lightroom processing steps:


1. **Assign a RAW profile:** Click on the *Profile browser icon* (red arrow in figure below). Hover your mouse over the different profiles and select the best profile. Normally you will select Adobe Color or Adobe Landscape.



- 2. **Get the Color right:** This step sets the *White Balance* (3-ways). (1) You can select one of the profiles from the drop-down list such as Auto, As Shot, Daylight, etc. (2) You can also select the White Balance Selector Tool (eyedropper) and click on a neutral color. (3) Finally, you can adjust the Temp and Tint sliders.
- 3. **Expand the Tonal Range:** This step sets the *White Balance*. Hold down the Shift key and double-click on the word White and Black. You will notice that the Histogram will expand across the entire tonal range and remove spikes at either end.
- 4. **Deal with Sensor Limitations:** One of the problems you may experience is a washed-out sky. To get a better-looking sky move the *Highlight slider to -100*. Also, to further adjust the sky, use the Graduated Filter over the sky. You can adjust the Temp slider to make the sky bluer. If the Graduated Filter adjusts landscape areas, use the Range Mask set to Luminance and move the Range slider to the right.
- 5. Painting with Light and Retouching: Select the *Adjustment Brush* and move the **Exposure slider** to the right (increases midtones). Paint over dark areas. Note: In Local Adjustments, dragging the Saturation slider on the plus side [dragging right] is **vibrancy** and minus [dragging left] is **desaturation**.
- 6. **Fix Lens issues:** First thing to do is *straighten objects* using the Lens Correction panel and check the Enable Profile Corrections box. Next open the *Transform panel* and click on the **Auto button**. If the two automatic corrections don't correct leaning objects, then take your photo into Photoshop (**Ctrl+E**). Make a selection of the leaning object and duplicated the selection on its own layer (**Ctrl+J**). Then select Free Transform (**Edit>Free Transform or Ctrl+T**). Right-click inside the selection and in the popup, menu select **Warp**. Pull one of the top control points straight up until the object is straight. To make the cutout blend better with the background, add a *Mask* and paint with a Black brush. Note you may need to align the straighten object using the *Move Tool*.
- 7. **Finishing moves:** Sharpen the image using the Detail panel. For RAW images the default amount is 40 which is normally not enough. For JPEG images the default amount is 0 since the camera software will add sharpening. Be sure to zoom into the image by 100% when sharpening and when adding too much sharpening it can cause halos. Another finishing move is to add a vignette. In the Effects panel move the Amount slider to **–11**.

• Centered Crop Overlay

- There may be times when you want a photo to be cropped on a centered crop.
 - 1. Select the Centered Crop Overlay by choosing **Tools>Crop Guide Overlay** and in the popup menu select **Center.**
 - 2. OR press **O** on your keyboard to cycle through the other overlays until the Center crop overlay appears.
 - 3. Note: If there are overlays you don't want to see (or see), choose **Tools>Crop Guide Overlay** and in the popup menu select **Choose Overlays to Cycle** option.
- When you crop, I recommend you do the following:



- 1. Hide all the panels by depressing the **Shift+Tab** keys on your keyboard.
- 2. Enable Lights Out by depressing the L key twice.
- 3. With the Centered Overlay showing, hold down the Alt key (Mac: Shift Option) and click and drag a corner towards the center. All four comers will move inward simultaneously.
- **To Level your photo:** Move your cursor outside of your photo and the cursor turns into a double-headed arrow. Then drag the cursor either up/down to rotate the photo. As you start to rotate the photo, the overlay changes to a Grid to assist you in leveling.







